## Baseball Win on Monday

### PLAY LACROSSE FOR HOSPITAL SHIP FUND

Rosedales Issue Formal Challenge to Nationals for Series of Three Games.

F. W. Thompson, president, and H. S. Merton, manager, of the Rosedales Lacrosse Club, over their signatures yesterday issued a formal challenge to the Nationals, addressing their letter to President A. L. Carson in Montreal, who is reported to be personally in favor of the meeting. The conditions are as follows:

On behalf of the Rosedales Lacrosse Club of Toronto, champions of the National Lacrosse Union, we hereby challenge you to a series of matches to determine the championship of the east, upon the following conditions:

(1) Games are to be played, one in Toronto, one in Montreal, and a third game, if necessary, upon grounds to be mutually arranged.

(2) Twenty per cent of the net proceeds of the games are to be donated to the Hospital Ship Fund.

(3) The remaining 80 per cent is to be divided—40 per cent to the winner upon the round, and 40 per cent to the loser.

(4) The matches are to be played, commencing Sept. 12, and following Saturdays, and we must have your acceptance not later than Aug. 24.

(5) Trustees of the Hospital Ship Fund are to take command of the gates, and make the proper appointment of the proceeds according to agreement.

(6) Only players are eligible to compete in these matches who have played for the competing teams during the season, and the number of the men upon the teams to play will be twelve men a side for one and ten men a side for the other of the first two games.

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### STOP THE LEADERS BEAVERS WIN ONE

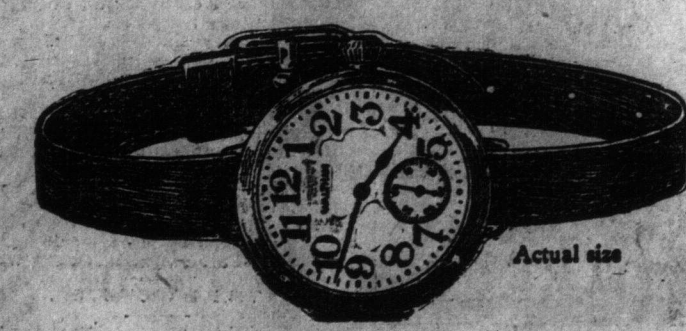
