The bureau is asking the manufacturers and citizens of Toronto to co-operate with it in supplying odd jobs or permanent work of any kind. A phone message will serve.

UNEMPLOYED MEET.

Suggested That They March is Strength to City Hall. A meeting of unemployed is being held this afternoon, at 3 o'clock, at Bayside Park, when the question of what is to be done towards securing work during the winter was discussed.
