tion of their waggon ways and engines, the filling up of their coal pits, the burning of their ships, and lastly, (to use a new-coined and elegant Scotch phrase) the starvation of London, and every town where the meat is roasted, the pot boiled, and the hands warmed with Newcastle coal, must produce. It should be observed, that Sunderland, its. quay, its shipping, and its contiguous coal, pits, will all, in such an event, share the I affert, that the fort and batfame far tery at Tromouth, are not equal to the defence of the harbour; from their fituation and other circumstances, they must be taken in a few hours. I need not fay, that a French engineer will be at no loss on what fide to attack them; and it is not by way of exposing the weak parts of our country that I fay thus much, but to urgo the expedience of strengthening them, and to shew the necessity of giving Lord Percy. at least, ten thousand men to defend the North. I say the North, for the business may be done from Newcastle to Whitehaven, and many miles North and South of each, before the express shall have reached
