FRANCE WANTS TO BORROW \$40,000,000.

London, Jan. 31.—The St. James Gaz-ette says the French Government is negotiating with French and British financiers for a loan of \$40,000,000, to be devoted to army and navy purposes. It is the intention of France to increase her navy during the year, and her army will also receive attention, including the introduction of a quick-

firing gun.
The paper asserts that it learns from a trustworthy source that orders have already been given to English firms, and that others are to follow. It adds: "France, naturally, is desirous of maintaining peaceful relations with England during the next few months, in order to obtain all the possible financial help in this country. So far the loan arrangements in London are only in the most embryonic condition, and the proposals are looked at in a luke-warm manner."

She will come to London in July, and after a short rest will go to New York in time for the opening of the fall season. DEATH OF PRINCESS FERDINAND Sofia, Bulgaria, Jan. 31.—Princess Ferdinand, of Bulgaria died today of pneumonia. She gave birth to a daughter yesterday evening. Princess Ferdinand of Bulgaria was Mary Louise, eldest daughter of Duke Robert of Han. She was born Jan. 17, 1870, and was married on April 20, 1893, to Prince Ferdinand, the reigning prince of Bulgaria, youngest son of the late Prince Augustus of Saxe-Coburg and Gotha and Princess Clementine Burbon-Orleans, daughter of King Louis Philippe.

MORE PORRIDGE

Marion Brown Has Grown Tired of Jail Fare and Requests a Change in His Diet.

Marion Brown, the peg-leg and alleged murderer, now in jail, awaiting trial, has during the last few days registered a "vigorous kick" against the class of food he is given to eat. Brown says he will eat no more of that "Scotch meal," that he doesn't like it. and can't eat it in any shape or form. The prisoner thinks he has had porridge and molasses long enough now, and wants a change. Prison fare may be plain enough, but there are many honest, well-behaved persons these cold days who would rejoice to get it. Prisoners' fare consists of eight ounces of bread three times a day, every day in the week. Besides this, they are given a pint of porridge, and an allowance of molasses for three days in the week. On the other three they receive in addition to the bread, five ounces of meat free of bone, a pint of soup, and an allowance of potatoes. Brown has fared much better than some prisoners, for every Sunday he is allowed to partake of a good square meal, furnished by his counsel, Mr. McPhillips. When Brown was first jailed here he had something like \$1.75 in cash, and the major portion of this was expended at nis own request at different times on bologna sausage, for which he had a great weakness. It is very unlikely that any change in provisions will be made so far as Brown is concerned, as in the opinion of the authorities, it would be establishing a bad precedent, which might culminate in no end of trouble. Brown is healthy and looks well, so the jail officials sav.
