## Wave of Indignation

**Sweeps the Press of Both Parties in Great Britain**

**At Lord Salisbury's Alleged Backdown to Russia.**

**Statement From the Foreign Office at London.**

**The Alleged Backdown of the British Government**

**Britain "Is Not Going To Be Jockeyed Out of Her Trade."**

**Gen. Lockhart to Remain in India—King George Discouraged—More Turkish Atrocities—American Fruit Barred Out of Germany.**

**SIX GIRLS KILLED.** Bergamo, Lombardy, Feb. 3.—Six work girls were killed and many others seriously injured when the roof of the spinning mill collapsed in the storm.

**DISASTROUS EARTHQUAKES.** Constantinople, Feb. 3.—Violent earthquake shocks have been felt at Balkis, Asia Minor, and around Brusa, Asia Minor. Numerous fatalities have occurred, and great damage has been done.

**SLAP AT UNCLE SAM.** Berlin, Feb. 3.—The Prussian minister of finance, Dr. Miquel, issued a declaration yesterday, which goes into effect immediately, prohibiting the importation of every kind of American fresh fruit.

**A BULGARIAN GRIEVANCE.** Constantinople, Feb. 3.—The Bulgarian agent has presented a note to the Turkish government, pointing out the serious nature of the occurrences in the vilayet of Uskub, where 82 Bulgarians have been arrested on the pretext of a sensational note.

**SKEPTICAL.** London, Feb. 3.—The Berlin correspondent of the London papers are all skeptical as to the alleged reason for the exclusion of American fresh fruit. They doubt that the cause is the discovery of a bug in a box of apples in Germany. The exclusion is at the South rather than the agrarian demand for reprisals against the American tariff.

**A DISCOURAGED KING.** Berlin, Feb. 3.—The Lokai Anzeiger respondent, saying that King George is greatly depressed by the situation in Greece. In conversation the other day with a number of prominent men he declared his willingness to abdicate if the nation wished to establish a republic. He would even assist in the selection of a suitable president.

**PARIS, FEB. 3.—**During the discussion of the naval estimates in the French chamber of deputies, M. J. Deckerjenn, republican reporter of the committee, replying to criticisms of the navy, contended that the French ships were quite equal to those of foreign navies. Vice-Admiral Benard, minister of marine, said the government's naval programme had made the Mediterranean a French lake. He intended now to build ironclads for extra European waters, with an extensive sphere of action, and a larger number of small armored cruisers.

**GEN. LOCKHART WILL STAY.** Bombay, Feb. 3.—It is now announced that Gen. Sir William Lockhart, who commanded the Tirah expedition, and who, it was understood, had been relieved of his command by Gen. Sir Arthur Power Palmer, has decided to remain in India, with the view of recovering the ground lost by the disease covering the fourth brigade of the British troops near Shinkamur on Saturday last. Gen. Lockhart will attempt to recover the arms captured from the tribesmen.

**THE PLAGUE IN INDIA—FEAR OF A PANIC.** Bombay, Feb. 3.—Quarantine barriers are being established in all the towns against the Bombay exodus. Lord Sandhurst, the governor, fearing that the plague will spread rapidly in a few weeks, and that through the opening of a large population a panic is likely to develop, has issued an order inviting those affected by the disease to leave the islands across the harbor. Detachments from the Durhamshire regiment at Poona and the artillery and the Shropshire regiment at Colaba have been ordered to Bombay for plague duty.

**CABLE NOTES.** Beauchamp Henry John Scott, sixth Earl of Clonmell, is dead. He was 81 years of age, and was formerly a captain in the Scots Guards. A terrible gale has swept the coast of Norway during the last few days. There have been several shipping disasters, and it is feared many lives have been lost.

**AT THE Gaiety Theater, London, last** evening, a man was arrested for charging a pistol in the gallery. No one was hurt. There was no panic.

## Terrace on Fire.

**About Twenty People Turned Hastily Out.**

**While the Thermometer Was Six Degrees Below Zero—Blaze at the Corner of Pegler Street and Hamilton Road—Damage Slight.**

At 5:15 this morning the fire department was called out to attend a blaze in a terrace in which four families reside, at the corner of Pegler street and the Hamilton road. A defective chimney, it is supposed, in the residence occupied by Mr. Chas. Warren, the second from the east end of the terrace, was the cause of the trouble. The fire burned slowly and was contained in the residence, but the firemen had two hours and twenty minutes' work before they could leave. All the residents of the terrace were greatly alarmed, and the four families, those of Mr. Chas. Warren, Mr. Thos. Roberts, Mrs. Blundell and Mrs. Geddes, turned hastily out in the frosty air. They were not long in getting shelter, for the thermometer registered six degrees below zero. Mr. Warren's furniture was nearly all taken out, and the building to the extent of about \$300. Foreman McMurchie said it was the coldest run his department has had for several winters. Once the water was turned on the stream had to be kept going, or it would have frozen in the hose. The alarm was sent in from box 514, the first of the new boxes to be pulled. It registered perfectly, contrasting greatly with the old boxes.
