WESTERN ONTARIO BIG SUFFERER FROM THE SHORTAGE OF COAL

Ottawa, Dec. 29 .- So far as is known at the capital, there has not been unusual suffering in Canada as a result of the severe weather and the coal situation. The shortage of coal is, at least for the present it is believed, confined to a limited number of localities, more particularly perhaps the smaller cities and towns of Western Ontario. At the capital coal dealers state that while supplies at present on hand are low they expect a decided improvement in the situation in about a fort-night. Mayor Fisher states that the present supply is sufficient to fill all wants, if properly distributed, until further shipments arrive. He is keeping in close touch with the fuel controller, who is doing everything possible to speed up shipments to Canada.

WAR ENDS WHEN HUNS WHIPPED.

New York, Dec. 29 .-Speaking within forty-eight hours after the receipt in this country of the kaiser's latest peace terms, Secretary of War Baker declared last night that the war would not end until all danger of a "triumphant barbarism" had been removed, until civilization had defeated savagery. In an address at the annual dinner of the Phi Gamma Della fraternity, of which he is a member, the secretary of war delivered in measured terms and scathing language an indictment of the German Government and its rule, "or misrule," of the

German people. After revealing the determination of the nation to fight on for its ideals, and showing that in his mind there had been conjuring with the kaiser's peace proposals, Mr. Baker said: "The result of this war will not be the taking away from somebody of something that is theirs, but the result will be a donation—a donation of new liberty-to all men everywhere."

Record Cold Snap Covers Country From Coast To Coast and May Last Several Days-Cities and Small Towns of West Ontario Hard Hit Through Lack of Fuel-Brantford May Seize All Excess Private Stocks For Benefit of Public—Quebec Has Lowest Temperature Since 1860.

Washington, Dec. 29 .- A great thick blanket of intensely cold weather, lying sluggishly over the country from the upper Mississippi Valley to the seaboard, has plunged the whole eastern section of the United States and Canada into a cold snap from which the weather bureau foresees no immediate relief.

While record low temperatures may be shown in some places, the cold generally does not equal that of the mid-December snap, but it is none the less effective as an agent of distress and suffering in many localities where there are coal shortages, intensified by the increased difficulties of transportation.
