PROHIBITION TIGHTENED UP BY U.S. HOUSE

Vote Is 287 To 100 in Favor of Measure,

CONSIDERED DEATH-KNELL

Prediction Is That Traffic Has Been Suppressed "Forever."

WASHINGTON, July 22.—By a vote of nearly three to one, the House, weary of talk on prohibition, today passed a bill for its enforcement, with provisions and penalties so drastic as to bring from the men who framed it the prediction that it would forever suppress the liquor traffic on American soil.

Exactly one hundred members—52
Democrats and 48 Republicans—refused
to support it. Against this even hundred, the probbitionists, putting up a
solid front to the very last, polled 287 Sona front to the very last, polled 287 votes. The measure now goes to the Senate, where many of its restrictions may be modified or stricken out. The cloakroom rumor persisted that all of this legislative effort might end on the shoal of a presidential veto, although the general view was that it would be signed as passed igned as passed.

Provisions of Bill.

f internal revenue (this applies to hemists, physicians, etc.) After February 1, 1920: The possesand it will not be illegal to have in one's possession, liquor in a private dwelling, while the same is occupied and used by the possessor as his private dwelling, and the liquor is used for peronal consumption by the owner, his amily or his guests. The possessor of such liquors, however, bears the burden of proof that the liquor was acquired and is possessed lawfully.

Intoxicating liquor is defined as a peverage containing more than one-half per cent of alcohol Any house, boat, vehicle of other place where liquor is manufactured or sold is declared a nuisance.

No person shall manufacture, sell, barter, give away, transport, import, export, deliver, furnish or receive any

intoxicating liquors.
Liquor for non-beverage purposes and wine for sacramental uses may be sold under specified regulations.

CANADIANS TRIED FOR MANSLAUGHTER FOLLOWING RIOTS

Members of Canadian Units Held On Serious Charge.

LONDON, July 22.-Privates F. H. Wilkie, 102nd Canadian Battalion; J. Connors, 13th Canadian Highlanders: A. McKester, 3rd Canadian Reserve; A. Masse and R. A. McAllan, both of Camp D Forestry Corps, who gere committed for trial at Bow street for manslaughter in connection with the eath of Sergenat Green of the Epson notice, and also Bugler Robert Todd, of the Canadians, who was committed in a coroner's warrant, were brought up in the Surrey assizes.
