MOUNT CLEMENS, Mich., July 22.—Examination of Henry Ford by Attorney Elliott G. Stevenson, for The Chicago Daily Tribune, defendant in Mr. Ford's \$1,000,000 libel suit, was concluded today and interrogation passed into the friendly hands of Alfred Lucking, Mr. Ford's personal attorney.

Mr. Ford said that he was born of farmer parents at Dearborn, Mich., his present home.

"Did you tell John Reed, the magazine writer, that you built a \$30,000 house for your gatekeeper?" asked Mr. Lucking.

"No," smiled the manufacturer. "There is nothing but a sort of children's playhouse, about ten feet by ten."

"It was just a bit of the writer's imagination?"

"Yes."

No Armed Guards.

CIVIC EMPLOYEES OF WINNIPEG WHO WENT OUT LOSE HOLIDAYS

WINNIPEG, July 22.—No holidays will be given to civic employees who went on strike. A resolution to this effect was passed at last night's council meeting by a vote of seven to six. It was argued that this action was necessary if the public works program was to be completed this year.

The proposal to ask the Dominion Government to help pay the cost of the special police engaged during the strike was accepted by the council. The cost amounts to \$209,655.09.

Unique Issue of Industrial Preference Shares Being Made by Canadian Wool- lens Limited—No Bond Issue and Special Redem- ption Features—Strong Board of Directors.

TORONTO, July 22.—There are several unique features about the Canadian Woolens Limited, which is making a \$1,750,000 7 per cent cumulative preferred shares now being offered to the public. In the first place the company is starting operations with no bonded indebtedness standing in front of the preference stock; and, moreover, the preferred share issue a year will be established, commencing with the 1st of July, 1921, and will provide for the redemption of a goodly proportion of the preference shares, and accumulated profits should easily provide for the balance. Redemption can take place after the 1st of July, 1922, by drawings at 110, or in the open market at a price not in excess of 110.

The total authorized capitalization of the company is \$3,500,000, made up of preferred and common \$100 shares. The aggregate earnings of the Auburn Woolen Company, the Standard Woolen Mills Company and the Bonner-Worth Company, the three firms now amalgamated under the name of Canadian Woolens Limited, have averaged nearly a third of a million dollars a year for the past five and a half years, or over two and a half times the total annual preferred dividend on the present capitalization.

An unusually strong board of directors is associated with the company. Mr. I. Bonner of Paris is general manager of Penmans Limited; Mr. A. O. Dawson of Montreal, vice-president and managing director of the Canadian Cottons Limited; Mr. R. Sweeney of Hamilton, president of the Zimmerman Reliance Limited; Mr. J. D. Perry of Toronto, vice-president of Barons Cloth Company; and Messrs. J. B. Ferguson, W. K. George and F. B. Hayes are well known in connection with the development of important Canadian industries.

The organizers of the amalgamation estimate that net profits will be considerably larger under the merger, as present orders are a great deal in excess of all previous records, and the quite considerable saving in administration expenses will increase the surplus available for shareholders. The preference shares are being offered at par, and carrying a 25 per cent bonus on common stock. A syndicate made up of the Canada Bond Corporation, Ferguson & O'Rourke and Hanson Bros. are handling the issue.

PROHIBITION TIGHTENED UP BY U.S. HOUSE

Vote Is 287 To 100 in Favor
of Measure.

CONSIDERED DEATH-KNELL

Prediction Is That Traffic
Has Been Suppressed
"Forever"

WASHINGTON, July 22.—By a vote of nearly three to one, the House today passed a bill for prohibition, today passed a bill for its enforcement, with provisions and penalties so drastic as to bring from the men who framed it the prediction that it would forever suppress the liquor traffic on American soil.

Exactly one hundred members—52 Democrats and 48 Republicans—refused to support it. Against this even hundred, the prohibitionists, putting up a solid front to the very last, polled 287 votes. The measure now goes to the Senate, where many of its restrictions may be modified or stricken out. The cloakroom rumor persisted that all of this legislative effort might end on the shoal of a presidential veto, although the general view was that it would be passed.

Provisions of Bill.

The bill as it passed the House, provides:

After January 26, 1920: Every person permitted under the law to have liquor in his possession shall report the quantity and kind to the commissioner of internal revenue (this applies to chemists, physicians, etc.).

After February 1, 1920: The possession of any liquor, other than as authorized by the law, shall be prima facie evidence that it is being kept for sale or otherwise in violation of the law. It will not be a defense to report, and it will not be illegal to have in one's possession, liquor in a private dwelling, while the same is occupied and used by the possessor as his private dwelling, and the liquor is used for personal consumption by the owner, his family or his guests.

The possessor of such liquor, however, bears the burden of proof that the liquor was acquired and is possessed lawfully.

Two and a Half Per Cent Limit.

Intoxicating liquor is defined as a beverage containing more than one-half per cent of alcohol.

Any house, boat, vehicle or other place where liquor is manufactured or sold is declared a nuisance, and may be closed by order of the commissioner.

No person shall manufacture, sell, barter, give away, transport, import, export, deliver, furnish or receive any intoxicating liquors.

Liquor for non-beverage purposes and wine for sacramental use may be sold under special regulations.

Denatured alcohol, medicinal preparations (including patent medicines) for beverage purposes, toilet articles, flavoring extracts and vinegar are exempted.

Liquor advertisements of all kinds are prohibited.

Sale, manufacture or distribution of compounds, intended for use in the unlawful manufacture of liquor, is prohibited, together with sale or publication of recipes for home manufacture.

CANADIANS TRIED FOR MANSLAUGHTER FOLLOWING RIOTS

Six Members of Canadian
Units Held On Serious
Charge.

LONDON, July 22.—Privates F. H. Wilkie, 102nd Canadian Battalion; J. Connors, 13th Canadian Highlanders; A. McKester, 3rd Canadian Reserve; A. Masse and R. A. McAllan, both of Camp D Forestry Corps, who were committed for trial at Bow street for manslaughter following the riots of the Canadian soldiers who were brought up in the Surrey assizes, Justice Darling presided. They were indicted for unlawful and riotously assembling to disturb the peace and causing damage to property. All the accused were defended and pleaded not guilty.

Sir Ernest Wild, the prosecutor, briefly told the story of the disturbances. He declared Connors had been seen near the spot where Sergeant Green had been struck down and had also been seen striking him. Counsel submitted that as the accused were among the rioters and the death of Green had resulted from that common and unlawful purpose, each of them was guilty of manslaughter.

Fallings Shown as Weapons.

Inspector Pawley, who was in charge of the police at Epsom, described how the police had held the rioters at bay for an hour. He produced specimens of the weapons used by the soldiers, namely, spiked iron palings.

Mr. Abinger, in cross-examination, asked whether the soldiers had run amuck.

Pawley replied, "They had murder in their hearts."

Major J. P. Bird, Canadian Army Medical Corps, adjutant at Woodgate Camp, said there was no forced march there to deal with these three or four hundred men.

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Enormous Shipment of Mail from U.S. for German People

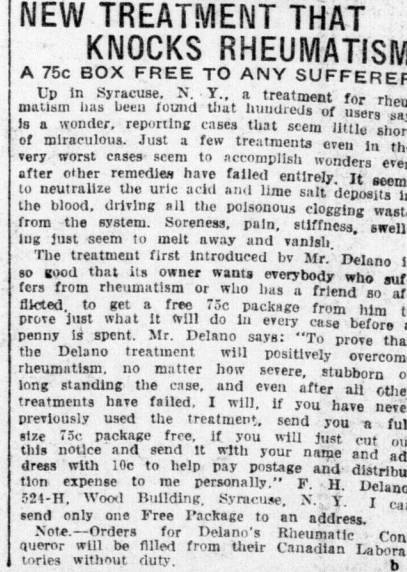
