Surgeons Who Conducted Post-Mortem Examination Find Two Bullets Entered From Front — General Herrera Reports President Took His Own Life Rather Than Be Captured.

Vera Cruz, May 25.—Reports of an autopsy performed on the body of Venustiano Carranza, at Tlaxcalantongo, fail to agree with the claim of Rodolofo Herrera that the president committed suicide rather than be taken captive, it is asserted in official quarters here.
