LONDON, April 27.—The funeral sernoon to-day over the body of Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman, the late premier of Great Britain, who died Abril 22, in the presence of a large gathering, representing the political life of fingland. After the service a short procession moved from the abbey to Euston station, where a special train took the coffin to Scotland. It was a typical gloomy London day, and a dismal rain was falling when the simple cortege made its way thru the streets.
