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Golden Wedding

Yesterday afternoon Mr. and Mrs. John N. Lake of 175 Park-road, Rosedale, entertained their friends in their new residence, commemorating the 50th anniversary of their marriage. He has been a member of several general conferences and treasurer of many of the funds of the church, the union church relief fund in particular, for 23 years. He was the organizer and first superintendent of the Sherbourne-street Sunday school for eleven years and he laid the cornerstone of the present church in 1886. Both Mr. and Mrs. Lake belong to the third generation of Canadian Methodism. Mrs. Lake's grandfather being the late Rev. Thomas Whitehead, a prominent pioneer in the early part of the last century. Mr. Lake's grandfather

was the leader of the first class formed by Loe in the Township of Ernestown in 1792. All the relatives in the city and some from Trenton, Tilsonburg, Hagersville and Napanee, numbering about 250, spent the evening together. Western Methodists' Policy on the Liquor Question.
