CORONER AND ATTORNEY ARGUE AT AN INQUEST

And Latter Secures an Adjournment So That Foreman May Give His Lvidence.

HAMILTON, Jan. 5 .- (Special.) Coroner McNichol and George S. Kerr, K.C., had a lively argument this evening at the inquest into the death of Benjamin D. Rubis, the Italian killed at the steel plant last Wednesday. Mr. Kerr represented the dead man's family, and asked for an adjournment so that the evidence of the foreman under whom Rubis worked could be heard. The coroner held that the inquest was not to determine whether to show the cause of death. Mr. Kerr contended that the inquiry was to show by what means death was caused, and after several jurymen had taken part in the discussion, and the Kinrade case had been cited as a precedent, Mr. Kerr carried his point, and the inquiry was adjourned, so that Foreman Frank Denz, may attend. The medical testimony was to the effect that death was due to suffocation, the unfortunate man having been buried

NEW DISCOVERIES OF

Dr. Edgar L. Hewett Lectures on Recent Excavations in Vi!lages of Uliff-Dwellers.

Doubtless the weather was responsible for the poor attendance at the interesting illustrated lecture by Dr. Edgar L. Hewett of Santa Fe, New Mexico, on the excavations of the American Archaeological Institute last evening in the physics buliding of To-

ronto University.

Dr. Héwett, who was introduced by E. B. Osler. M.P., confined his remarks to dealing with the remains of the civilization of the cliff-dwellers, the ancient Pueblos. These were of two general types. The one was found in the San Juan range of mountains. In the vicinity of Navajo Mountains was a well defined ethnic district where this ancient culture reached almost its culmination.

In the better known cliff towns of the southwest, he said, the remains of the cliff-dwellers had been shamefully vandalized, by the white people, but in the remote region of the new dis-coveries the villages were found in a good state of preservation.

The second class of remains was found on the "mesas" or islands of tufa to the west of the Rio Grande in Northwest New Mexico. These con-sisted of villages extending the full length of the talus slope at the base of the mesa, and of community houses
