'Organized Labor Welcomes You,' as displayed in a motto on the wall, well expressed the feeling that pervaded the social function with which the Labor Temple (the old Athenaeum Club on Church-street) was officially thrown open last night.

At 8 o'clock the Rev. Dr. Smith, the speaker was introduced by David Carey, chairman of the board of directors, and others on the platform were John Tweed and Secretary Simpson.

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The court of appeal of the Methodist Church of Canada, presided over by Rev. Dr. Carman, after two sessions in the Wesley Buildings, on Tuesday and Wednesday, gave decisions in four cases submitted for argument, last night.

David Laird.

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COMMITTEE SPENT THE DAY BRINGING FORTH OBSTACLES

Question of Itinerancy Long Discussed and Unity Approached Only in General Terms.

The Presbyterian, Methodist and Congregational committees, which on Tuesday discussed among themselves the question of church union, met in joint and private session at Knox Church yesterday morning and afternoon, and adjourned to hold separate committee meetings in the evening at their respective places of meeting, to talk over the deliberations of the day.

The delegates were rather late in arriving in the morning, and it was close to 11 o'clock before the Scriptural lessons were read and prayers offered. The subject of the lesson was charity.

The morning discussion was wholly given over to the discussion of the question of itinerancy, which was discussed until after the afternoon. Rev. Dr. Carman argued for the truth of the Gospel on a firm basis.
