

## WITH THE PIN-SPILLERS

The past week saw the resumption of bowling in the city after laying off for the Christmas holidays, and this week will see all the leagues in action. The festive season good living seemed inclined to put the bowlers out of their stride, and for the most part the scores of the opening week of 1911 were low.

The leadership of the first series of the evening section of the Printers' League was decided on Thursday night, when the Toronto Typetting team maintained their lead and won out by capturing two games from the MacLean Publishing Company, the contenders in the race.

The Athenaeum set a new record for the Athenaeum League on Friday night, when they hung up the good total of 231, beating their own mark by 79 pins. Karrys also put up another record for rollers of the league, 23 after, when he had a 508 total for his three games.

In the Business Men's League the past week Langmuirs, who have been leading all season, yielded next position to Eaton's. The big score was won into the top place when they took the entire series from the Telegram, and the Printers lost two hard-fought games to the National Cash Register.

The Dominion Express Company made their debut in the local bowling world in the week that has just ended, and they have organized a league composed of ten clubs, and roll on the Athenaeum alleys.

In connection with the big N.B.A. tournament to be held in Buffalo, commencing Feb. 2, preparations for which are progressing with every indication of a brilliant success. The World is able to make an announcement which will be a most agreeable surprise to many bowlers in the city. Manager T. Ryan of the Toronto Bowling Club has secured permission from Vice-president Floss, who is secretary and general manager of the tournament, to hold a mammoth novice event as a special attraction. This was a feature that the National Bowling Association had originally intended to eliminate from the tournament, and they had consequently made no provision for it. However, on the promise of bringing fifty-five teams to Buffalo for an event of that kind, the consent was quickly given to Mr. Ryan to go ahead with his plans, and full power was vested in him as to the ways and methods in which they would be carried out.

In securing this event, Mr. Ryan was acting primarily in the interests of the members of the Toronto Bowling Club, which is this year composed of many rollers who have only recently taken up the bowling machine, but who are rapidly becoming versant with its habits and customs. Besides, there are many old bowlers in this club, and in other clubs in the city, who could never hope to compete in the crack tenpin artists from the many big cities across the line, as well as those on this side, and consequently would never dream of entering the N.B.A. tournament. It is for the benefit of these that this novice tournament is being arranged. W. B. Thompson of Hamilton has entered into the arrangements with Mr. Ryan, and will take over ten teams, swelling the list to sixty. This large class of bowlers will now have the opportunity of engaging in an even contest on a set of eighteen brand new alleys erected for this tournament only, and equipped with the finest and most up-to-date appointments and devices. The N.B.A. will put up splendid prizes, almost equal to those offered for the big event.

The novice tournament will be entirely apart from the N.B.A. competition, and will be quite independent of the regular Canadian day rolling. It will be held on a different date, and a special train will leave Toronto at 11 o'clock in the afternoon, and returning leave Buffalo after midnight. It is possible that there may be too many for all to go the same day and roll, in which case two different dates will be arranged for the two sections. For the benefit of the Big Store crowd, a special will leave Toronto about 5 p.m. Electric trolleys will be decorated with Canadian emblems will meet the specials at the station, and the bowlers will be carried in a parade through the principal streets of Buffalo, and altogether they will be given a most desirable outing.

The entire arrangements will be conducted by Mr. Ryan, with whom all Toronto entries must be made, and who will decide all questions of eligibility. Teams will be required to conform to a standard, and no packing or bunching of high average men will be permitted, neither in the five-man teams nor in the doubles. The entrance

fees will be: Teams, \$10; doubles, \$5, and, singles, \$2.

On Canadian Day the Toronto Bowling Club will send over at least a half-dozen teams for the big event. Some of these will be: A picked team from the Business Men's League, a picked team from the Printers' League, the Toronto Typetting team and others.

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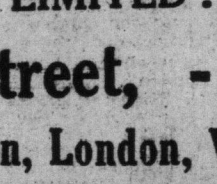
