THE WAR NEWS OVER LAST NIGHT'S CABLES

The United States is now at war with Austria-Hungary.
 With unanimity—except for a negative vote cast in the house of representatives by a Socialist member—both houses of congress Friday acted favorably on request made by President Wilson's recent address to congress that the United States declare war on the dual monarchy which the president asserted as "not her own mistress, but simply a vassal of the German government."
 There was scarcely any debate on the resolution in either house.
 Shortly after the action of the two houses of congress, President Wilson affixed his signature to the measure which officially aligned the United States in the task of making the world safe for democracy.
 The taking up of arms against Austria-Hungary comes at a most opportune time, for it will permit of the United States lending aid to sorely stricken Italy, where the Austro-Germans are striving their utmost to deal a blow in an endeavor to render the Italian a negligible factor in future operations. Turkey and Bulgaria were excluded from the operations of the war resolution, but the temper of both houses of congress indicates that when President Wilson shall ask for similar action against these countries, which he characterized as also the tools of Germany, as quick acquiescence in his desires will be forthcoming.
 That the Italians are being harassed by the enemy in greatly superior numbers and in gun power is indicated by the latest official communication.
 Additional gains have been made by the invaders in the Asiago Plateau, but again a heavy price in men killed or wounded was paid by the attacking forces. At last accounts the Italian line was still intact and the wayward against the enemy debouching on the Venetian Plain.
 Berlin war office in an announcement of fresh victories achieved against the allies asserts that 4,000 additional men have been made prisoner bringing the total since the new offensive began to fifteen thousand.
 Only minor operations are in progress on the other battle fronts.
 The cessation of hostilities along the eastern front has now extended to that part of the line held by the Roumanians. An official communication from Jassy, the Roumanian capital, says that as a result of the Russians having proposed an armistice to the enemy it had been decided that the Roumanians should associate themselves with the Russians and that therefore fighting has ceased. The Roumanians, however, have declined all attempts to fraternize with the enemy.


