COMMON COUNCIL

That wholesale thieving of coal is being carried on along the waterfront was brought to the notice of the common council yesterday afternoon, when Commissioner H. R. McLellan asked the board to consider the feasibility of adding to the department of public safety harbor policemen and a motor boat for their use.

Mayor Hayes, commissioner of finance and public affairs, reported payments for the month of October amounting to \$246,995.82, and recommended the following items to be paid on the departmental pay sheets: treasury department, \$198.19; public works, \$1,946.73; public safety, \$887.60; water and sewerage, \$2,220.87; harbors, ferries and public lands, \$2,700.40. The recommendation was passed.

After some little discussion and questioning by Commissioner McLellan, the recommendation of Commissioner Fisher that the Canadian Government Railway be granted permission to build a spur to the westward of the track at the foot of Charlotte street was finally passed. On Mr. Fisher's recommendation permission was granted the N. B. Telephone Company to move a pole in Vulcan street sidewalk in order that it may be in line with existing posts on Charlotte street and give space for teams at the railway siding. His final recommendation was that the plan of Cedar Grove Crescent and First street, recently submitted, and not up to the present time objected to by property owners, be held to await further word from the town planning commission, which, it is understood is considering a change in the lines of Cedar Grove Crescent. The recommendation was passed.

Commissioner McLellan made known at the meeting the intention of the safety board to regulate traffic through both Market streets so that occupants of the market and easement payers may not be made to suffer the inconveniences that they are now being caused by the passing of automobiles and other vehicles that make short cut to King square and Charlotte street. He concluded his remarks by saying that it was the duty of the department to see that market tenants had the privileges, unannounced, that were originally intended for them.

Mayor Hayes was asked by the commissioner what progress had been made on the hearing of the assessment report. Contrary to the opinion of some, he said, he felt that the calling in of an expert to go over the report would be of little
