WHOLESALE KILLING IN SAN DIEGO Ex-Fireman Shoots Three Former Comrades

KILLS WIFE AND CHILD Sent in False Alarm and Opened Fire on Men as They Answered the Call—Police Hunting for Murderer

San Diego, Cal., Aug. 1.—Bert S. Durham, a former fireman, after shooting and killing one city fireman, mortally wounding a second and seriously wounding a third, near a fire box from which he had sent a false alarm, in an effort to revenge himself on his former comrades, today shot his wife and child.

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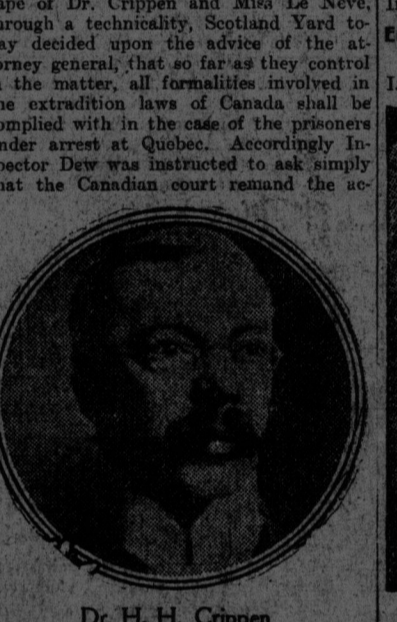
