May 14 - The first German fleet unit to leave for foreign ports since the World War sailed Thursday on a Mediterranean cruise to Spain and the Balsearic Islands.

Four battleships and two light cruisers comprise the squadron. High officials of the navy hope the trip will do much toward cementing the already cordial friendship between Germany and Spain. The four battleships making the trip are the flagship Schleswigs-Holstein, the Hanover, Elsass and Hessen. All are of the Deutschland

type, which was left to Germany by the Treaty of Versailles. The two light cruisers are the Nymph and the Amazone.

The squadron will head through the Channel, skirt the French Coast in a wide circle and cruise through the Bay of Biscay. It will then sail around the West Coast of Spain, pass the Straits of Gibraltar, and make for the Balearic Islands. There it will go into port, while officers and men visit Mahon and Palma. Further visits to Spanish ports will include one to Barcelona and Malaga on the east coast and

Vigo on the west. No other foreign points will be touched on the cruise.

Airship Has Fuel Sufficient For 3,000 Miles
