THE TARIFF BILL IS PRESENTED

Some Rates. The more important rates in the administration tariff as finally agreed upon in conference are: Agriculture Products. Cattle, from 1 1/2 to two cents a pound; sheep and goats, \$2 a head; fresh lamb, four cents a pound; hogs, 1/2 cent per pound; fresh pork, 3/4 cent per pound; bacon, ham and shoulder, two cents a pound; lard, one cent a pound; lard compounds and substitutes, four cents a pound; milk, fresh, 2 1/2 cents a gallon; butter, one cent a gallon; cream, twenty cents a gallon; milk, condensed or evaporated, 1 1/2 cents a pound; other butter subs, eight cents a pound; cheese and substitutes, five cents a pound; poultry, live, three cents a pound; poultry, dead, six cents a pound; eggs of poultry in the shell, eight cents a dozen; honey, three cents a pound; horses and mules, valued up to \$100 each, \$80 each; valued over \$100 each 20 per cent; fresh or frozen salmon, mackerel and halibut, two cents a pound; herring and mackerel, pickled or salt, one cent a pound; Irish potatoes, fifty cents per 100 pounds; tomatoes, 1/2 of one cent a pound; turnips, twenty cents per 100 pounds; hay, \$4 a ton.

Sugars and manufacturers of. Sugar, 2 1/2 cents a pound (1 1/2 per cent Cuban raw). Sugar, candy and all confectionery, forty per cent.

Wool and manufacturers of. Raw wool, thirty-one cents a pound of scoured content; clothing and other articles of wearing apparel, not knit or crocheted, from twenty-four cents a pound and forty per cent to forty-five cents a pound and fifty per cent.

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GERMANS KEEP DOOR OPEN FOR NEGOTIATIONS

Send Two Delegates to Paris for Reparations and Extension of Maturity Period. Berlin, Sept. 12.—In sending Dr. Fischer and Karl Bergmann to Paris again, with instructions to hold themselves at the disposal of the reparations commission, the German government has indicated its intention to continue negotiations.

Rejection of the German proposal for breaking off of the negotiations began last week with M. Bemelmans and M. De La Croix, the Belgian representatives, would be tantamount to a demand for prolongation of the term of issue of the treasury notes to be handed over to Belgium.

The impression also prevails among the German officials who participated in the discussions with M. Bemelmans and M. De La Croix that the latter personally were not opposed to acceptance of the proposal of Dr. Fischer.
