### A PROGRAMME OF FRENCH SONGS

They give popular expression to the current events of the day. Among these critical songs sung yesterday at the meeting were those referring to President Wilson and the fourteen points, Deschanel and his railway accident, the Washington conference and the high cost of living. Other typical French songs were sung, notably "Madelon," the song which had the greatest popularity during the war. The songs were also considered from a literary standpoint.
