## TRIES TO PUT BLAME ON TERMS OF PEACE TREATY

New German Chancellor's  
Address to National  
Assembly

Where He Places Responsibility for Reactionary Sentiment—Oppose French Demand—Says Reds Will Be Swept Away "With Iron Broom."

(Associated Press.)  
Berlin, March 30.—In the national assembly yesterday Chancellor Mueller, outlining his programme, said that the reactionaries in the army will be swept away with an iron broom. The new Chancellor devoted half of his speech to consideration of the recent revolution. He said no quarter will be shown to the military leaders who violated their oath. He added that the terms of the peace treaty were responsible for the reactionary sentiment prevailing in many quarters in Germany. He asserted the government would oppose the French demand for Allied occupation of Frankfurt, Darmstadt and other cities, in return for the privilege of sending German troops into the neutral zone. "The government," he continued, "does not propose to subject these peaceful communities to the terror of occupation."  
Dr. Mueller declared that the government was determined to prosecute the conspirators as well as the intellectual instigators of the revolution. The chancellor addressed his remarks to the right side of the house without making any special reference to individuals.  
The quick collapse of the Kapp regime, the chancellor continued, was due to the fact that there are still democrats in Germany. "Our duty now is to put them in the leading official positions."

## THE SKULL OF OKAWA

## KIDNAPPED BY PROHIBITION AGENTS OF U. S.

Sensational Story Comes  
From British Bahamas

Alleged Attack Upon and  
Seizure of Charles Vincenti,  
President of the Triaca  
Company on Charge of  
Conspiring to Violate the  
Dry Law.

Baltimore, Md., March 30.—The story of the alleged kidnapping of Charles Vincenti, president of the Triaca Company, by United States prohibition agents, at one of the islands of the British Bahamas, was told yesterday by Vincenti's lawyers.

He was brought here on a charge of conspiring to violate the "dry" law. His clothes were torn to shreds and he had a bad cut on his scalp which, it is alleged, the prohibition sleuths inflicted when they "shanghaied him" from the British island.  
Vincenti Demarco, one of Vincenti's lawyers, told this story today.  
"Mr. Vincenti obtained permission from British Customs Inspector Paley of Bimini, to erect a warehouse and agreed to present the warehouse to the British government when he ceased to use it," he said. "A little before sundown on Thursday a sea launch from Miami, manned by five men, appeared at the beach where he was at work. One of the men went ashore and asked Mr. Vincenti to step aboard the launch to ascertain the cargo capacity of the launch."
