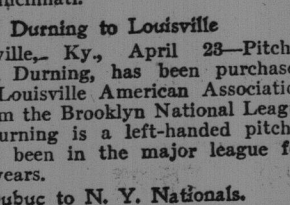
The Big League.
New York, April 22.—After an intermission of nearly eight months, the National and American Leagues will get back into action tomorrow. The season was cut short on September 2 last year, five weeks before the regular date, while the opening this spring is ten days later than usual, the league having cut their schedules from 154 to 140 games as an economic measure.
The 1919 season will be the forty-fourth for the National League. Its teams will open as follows:
New York in Philadelphia; Brooklyn in Boston; Pittsburgh in Chicago; St. Louis in Cincinnati.
In the American League the Boston world's champions will open here with the New York Yankees. The other American League openings are:
Philadelphia in Washington; Cleveland in Detroit and Chicago in St. Louis. This is the twentieth season for the American League.
John Heydler, president of the National League, today named the following umpires for the National League opening—Klen and Emslie, Boston; Rigler and Moran, Philadelphia; D. O'Day and Quigley, Chicago; Byron and Harrison, Cincinnati.

Durning to Louisville.
Louisville, Ky., April 23.—Pitcher Richard Durning, has been purchased by the Louisville American Association club from the Brooklyn National League club. Durning is a left-handed pitcher and has been in the major league for several years.

Dubuc to N. Y. Nationals.
Salt Lake, Utah, April 23.—Pitcher Jess Dubuc of the Salt Lake City Club of the Pacific Coast League, was today sold to the New York Nationals for a cash consideration. The price was not announced. Dubuc, who is a French-Canadian, was for many years with the Detroit Americans.

At Pinchurst.
Pinchurst, N. C., April 22.—The annual north and south trap shooting tournament at Pinchurst was brought to a close today with W. N. Boylston, Florida state champion, the winner of the 225 target contest and H. A. Merson of Charlotte, N. C., the victor in the north and south handicap. Boylston's record was 148-69-212. Merson broke 92 out of 100 targets, shooting from the 20 yard line.

his mind where the battle will be fought.

Manager Kearns said the articles call for the naming of the battle ground 60 days before the contest, which means Rickard has less than two weeks in which to announce the site.

"As the day of the fight approaches Jack becomes more confident," Kearns said. "He is sure he will stop Willard and do it quickly."

Plans Big Arena.

Plans for the erection in Montreal of a huge stadium to seat twenty thousand people are underway. "The International Hippodrome" is the project and Richard Wolston is the promoter.

The site of the proposed hippodrome is in Maisonneuve, and the promoters have the advantage of an excellent natural location, in that the site is in a huge excavation along the banks of which it is proposed to build seats which will provide for 12,000 people. The bottom of the enclosure will accommodate 8,000.

The hippodrome is primarily designed for sporting events, and boxing will be made a feature, so Mr. Wolston said. He believes that in a stadium of this kind bouts of international interest could be staged, as the boxing game is now at the height of its popularity in Montreal, and championship bouts staged in such a huge enclosure would pay well.

It is hoped to open the new hippodrome on May 24.

GIVING BACK WAR PROFITS.

The Bank of England, which, contrary to common belief, is not a state institution, but is privately owned, has set a remarkable example by agreeing to account to the government for the whole of its excess profits of the London Economy. "This," says the London Economist, "presumably means that all excess profits during the war period will be surrendered by the bank, which will then have done an enormous amount of very difficult and complicated work at cost price, and cleared itself of the charge of making the big war profits which the investigations of the national expenditure committee have revealed. The governor expressed his confidence that the Bank of England was the last institution in the country which would wish to make large war profits out of the public purse, and in view of its semi-official position this high line is clearly the right one."

Canadian banks have been active participants in the financing of war work in Canada, and though the claim is made by them that they had undertaken many new public services for which they are not paid, at the same time their annual statements made public during recent months have shown an all-round expansion of business and profits.

In the second place the present theory of wages does not fit the needs of the family with precision. It recognizes but does not solve the problem of family support. It makes no difference between a large and a small family. It makes no provision for periods of unemployment. It hangs the welfare of the child on an exceedingly slender thread.

Not Necessary to Wait Minimum Wage

However, the committee which is launching the plan for ending mothers' wages, like most other humanitarian phenomena, are not determined in a simple manner but are the result of a complex of circumstances. In this complex can be discerned the workers' productivity, his power of bargaining, and the number of his competitors. All these are coefficients of the standard of living.
