THE FUEL SITUATION.
J. H. Frink, fuel administrator for New Brunswick made the announcement last evening that the chartering committee of the United States Shipping Board, who had forbidden vessels to sail to the maritime province ports laden with anthracite coal, have adjusted their orders and all pending cargoes of coal to the maritime provinces are to be allowed. Even this does not relieve the local situation and citizens should lay in a supply of wood and soft coal, he advises.
