International Sport

New York, June 6.—The first international team trophy match of the present season will be played at Meadow Brook, L. I., on Tuesday, when the English and American polo fours meet in the initial game for possession of the international polo cup.

This polo trophy, which has cost both the American and English polo devotees hundreds of thousands of dollars to win and retain, was donated by the Westchester Polo Club of Newport in 1886.

During the twenty-eight years which have elapsed since the cup was offered as an international championship trophy in this sport five matches have been played, of which England has won two and the United States three.

Conditions cannot be said to be over-favorable for the retention of the trophy this year, since the English teams have been improving both in playing strength and tactics during the last few seasons and the 1914 combination will be opposed by a cup-defending team which is admittedly weaker than the United States team of the last three years.
