Miss Helen Wills, United States woman champion, defeated Miss Lillian Scherman, 6-1, 6-0.

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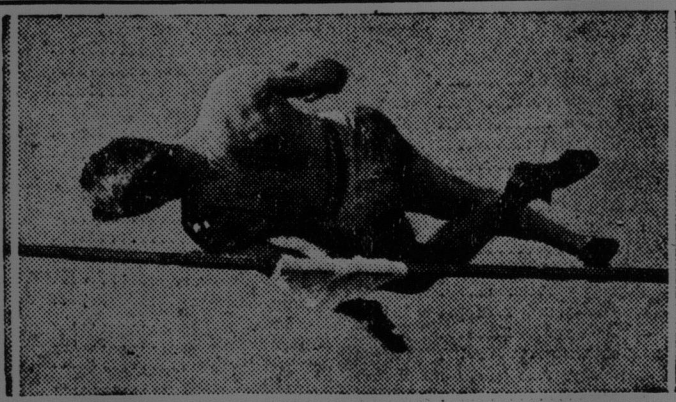

Harold Osborne's Style



These two views show Harold Osborne of University of Illinois, champion high jumper of America, in his high jump. In the smaller picture, Osborne's body has assumed an almost horizontal position and is seen literally rolling over the bar. French Olympic officials question this style. Critics in this country, however, pronounce it perfect. The other picture shows Osborne's finishing form in the high jump, an acrobatic lunge that suggests a somersault rather than a leap.

Osborne does not land in an upright position. As the picture shows, he alights on his hands and left foot, after the California manner. Across the Atlantic they say this is not only decidedly bad form, but illegal.

CANADA'S OLYMPIC BOXERS SELECTED

Details of "Nixey" Kennedy's Bouts Last Saturday Night at Toronto.

Canada's Olympic boxing team has been selected following the tournament Friday and Saturday. Eight boys will go at the expense of the Dominion, while an extra one has been recommended by the Olympic committee and the Montreal A. A. is expected to finance his journey.

Canada will only be entered in six of the eight classes on the Olympic programme, none being entered in the heavy divisions. The team is as follows:

112-pound class: J. McGregor, of Hamilton, and S. A. Rennie, Canadian champion, of the Grenadier Guards, Montreal.

135-pound class: J. Johnston, of Toronto.

160-pound class: Agnew Barrie, of the Granite A. C., Toronto; M. McGowan, Canadian champion of the M. A. A. A., Montreal, recommended.

180-pound class: Les Black, University of Toronto, and Harry Henning, Classic A. C., Toronto, Canadian champion.

In addition it has been announced that D. Stockton, of the Verdun Athletic Club, Montreal, has been selected for the wrestling team, it having been decided to send the light heavyweight along with the three lighter men previously chosen.

Concerning "Nixey" Kennedy's bouts Saturday, the Montreal Star says:

"The winner of the 135 pound class turned up in Cliff Graham, Toronto, one of the 1920 Canadian Olympic team. After 1920 Graham retired from the ring, but less than a year ago decided to try a comeback for this Olympic trip. He was certainly successful, for he won his semi-final on Saturday by a knock-out in the second round over Boyd McCulloch, of Toronto, and took the final from Raymond Kennedy, of Halifax, by a knock-out in the first round. Kennedy had beaten H. Cardinal, of Montreal, in the semi-final, and Kennedy pounded him severely in the face and made the blood ring. It looked as if Cardinal was through. But in the second round he came back strong and gave Kennedy some trouble. However, Kennedy rushed Cardinal to the ropes and the ring hand showed him over. Cardinal was suspended in mid-air with the rope on the middle of his back. His head did not hit the floor, but he was given one minute to recuperate. In the third round Cardinal was in trouble the early part, but went after Kennedy near the finish and had him in trouble. Kennedy earned the verdict, mainly because of his edge in the first round. It was not a good bout."

U. S. A. OLYMPIC TEAM IS STRONG

Uncle Sam's Athletes Will Put Up Strong Fight for World Honors.

An imposing array of track and field talent sailed recently on the liner America to compete for Uncle Sam at the Olympic games. It was made up of more than 300 athletes, including practically every athlete of note in the U. S. A. Compared with them, Canada's team of 25 pales into insignificance, while nothing sensational is expected of the Canadians, it is felt in most quarters what it lacks in quantity it will make up in class.

In the sprints, Cyril Coaffee and G. Heister will find foes worthy of their steel in Jackson Scholz, Charlie Paddock, Loren Marchison, Chester Bowman and others, while in the 400-metre event and the mile relay, "Billy" Maynes, Christie, Aylin and Dave Johnson will meet J. Coard Taylor, R. A. Robertson, E. C. Wilson, J. McDonald and others. Taylor, who broke the world's record for the 400 metres, was in Toronto during the winter and worked out at the Varsity track along with "Phil" MacDonald of P. E. I. and others.

In the 400-metre hurdles, MacDonald and Montblome will face competition from the United States in the persons of G. Taylor, C. R. Brookins, Iowa, C. F. Coulter and Ivan Reilly. In the high jump, "Zan" Miller will face such stars as Leroy Brown, H. M. Osborne, Tom Poor and R. L. Judy.
