RAIL SHARES ARE POPULAR IN WALL STREET

Heavy Buying Marks Resumption of Upward Trend of Market Today

PAPER ISSUES ARE MONTREAL FEATURES

Brazilian Traction, Smelters and National Breweries Also Receive Attention

NEW YORK, Dec. 15.—Heavy buying of the railroad shares featured the resumption of the upward price movement at the opening of today's stock market. Wheeling and Lake Erie Common, and Western Pacific opened at new 1925 high levels, and Louisville and Nashville showed an initial gain of one point. Latham Steel also attained a new record high price and Marine preferred, General Asphalt and Savage Arms moved up 1 to 2 points. Chrysler fell over 3 points on the first sale.

MONTREAL, Dec. 15.—The paper market opened this morning, the group being represented by Abitibi, off 1-4 at 74-3/4; Howard Smith, up 1-2 to 40-1/2; Spanish River, up 1-2 to 106-1/2; Price Bros. preferred XD down 1-2 at 58, and the common off 1-2 at 52; Laurentide up 1/2 to 91; Brompton, up 1-2 to 28-1/4. Brazilian also received considerable attention at 81-1/2, off 1-4. Smelters sold up 1-2 at 180-1/2, while National Breweries XD was off 1-8 at 56-1/4. The weak spot of the list was Dominion Gas XD a small lot of which appeared at 89-3/4, down 2-1/2.

I. looks as if it will go through 100. Steel should be bought on further reaction.

FIVE DIE BY GAS

Two Men Find Wives Dead When They Reach Their Homes

NEW YORK, Dec. 15.—Angelo Sinner found his wife, Louise, dead when he returned from work to his home here. She had sealed all apertures in the kitchen, fixed a gas tube in her mouth and turned on the gas. John Adam found that his wife, Adele, had ended her life with gas when he returned to their home. Ill health is believed to have prompted her.

Grieving for her husband, 63 years old, ended her life with gas in her home. "Please forgive me for the trouble I came you," she wrote in a note to her son, "but I cannot go on living without father."

Hannah Sincotky found dead from gas in a room at the Hotel Avenir, 282 West Sixty-first street, where the police say she had registered as Mrs. Allinena with James Allinena. John Susdent, 70, who lived with an Irish terrier, a gray cat and a canary, was found dead with his pet, a gas heater in the room having been turned on accidentally, it is believed.

WILL CONSIDER PENSION FUND FOR TEACHERS

They and School Board Committee to Confer on Matter

SCHOOL ATHLETICS UNDER DISCUSSION

Committee Appointed to Look Into Matter of Organization in Schools

The Board of School Trustees last night appointed a committee to look into the matter of the organization of school boy athletics through the schools and also arranged for a meeting with representatives of the Teachers' Association to confer on pensions and a pension fund. New standing committees were appointed because of the resignation of H. A. Porter and the board accepted the gift of a piano from the teachers and pupils of King George school.

Trust Officer G. Herbert Green reported there had been 28 children absent from school for lack of clothing. Boys, he said, were the chief need.

H. Colby Smith presided at the meeting. Others present were trustees, Mrs. E. R. Taylor, Mrs. D. P. Chisholm, T. H. Carter, E. R. W. Ingraham, Thomas Nagle, S. W. Palmer, Dr. J. K. Higgins, S. A. Worrell, acting-superintendent, and A. Gordon Leavitt, secretary.

ACTION APPROVED.
The action of the buildings' committee, in awarding to J. S. Coughlin a \$500 contract for installing additional radiators in King Edward School Assembly Hall, was approved as was the action of the department committee in passing a resolution of regret in the death of R. H. Moore, for two years a faithful member of the staff.

Applications for positions on the teaching staff were received from Miss G. Lunnery, Fred J. Rich, and Miss Edith Carvell, Miss A. Louise Gallivan, W. Heans, Kenneth Chown and Miss Eileen C. Lunnery.

APPLICATIONS FOR JANITOR.
The resignation of Miss Della M. Folsom from the teaching staff was accepted.

The Teachers' Association wrote stating that a committee had been appointed by the Association to confer with the trustees' representatives with reference to the establishing of a pension fund. The trustees' committee that will meet with the teachers is composed of Dr. L. M. Curran, Thomas Nagle and S. W. Palmer.

PURCHASE A PIANO.
Miss Margaret Briggs informed the Board that the teachers and pupils of King George school had secured funds to purchase a piano. The Board was asked to accept the piano and the gift was gratefully acknowledged.

Miss J. M. Neal asked for leave of absence and the request was referred to the teachers' committee.

The New Brunswick Power Co., Ltd., asked permission to install a guy line on the concrete of the wall of King Edward school. The wall needs repairs also, Mr. Palmer said.

Both matters were referred to the visitors of that school with power to act.

REQUEST FOR HIGH SCHOOL.
Notice was received that the Saint John Debating Club would conduct a debate on Jan. 23 with the Imperial debaters. A request was made for the use of the High School Assembly Hall to hold the debate and to charge an admission to cover expenses. The matter was referred to the school visitors and the acting superintendent, with power to act.

SECRETARY'S REPORT.

The secretary's report contained the following statistics for November: Pupils enrolled, 9,178; belonging boys, 4,241; girls, 4,937; total, 8,888; average of those belonging in daily attendance, 92.74 per cent.; teachers' visits, 283. Those not belonging totalled 289 and were accounted for as follows: Sick, 57; at work, 89; left city, 88; transferred, 60; truant, 45, and kept at home, 40.

The Board of Health reported there had been among school children seven cases of scarlet fever and one each of chicken-pox, diphtheria and measles.

TRUANT OFFICER'S REPORT.
G. H. Green, truant officer, reported having made visits to 186 homes and 17 schools. Pupils were absent as follows: Twenty-three for sickness; 62 temporarily; 28 for lack of clothing; seven because of moving; four being urged their attendance at classes of health instruction to be given in the Health Centre. The board granted this permission on condition that it be clearly understood that attendance at these classes was to be entirely voluntary.

SCHOOL ATHLETICS.
Mr. Worrell said he had been approached by those interested in school boy athletics, urging that organization for athletics be effected through the schools. He believed if this could be done school boy athletics could perhaps be controlled most satisfactorily.

It was agreed that a committee of three and the acting superintendent should be appointed to look into the matter and report back. Those named on the committee were Thomas Nagle, Mrs. E. R. Taylor and E. R. W. Ingraham.

The schools will close on Dec. 18 and re-open on Jan. 4, Mr. Worrell announced, and closing exercises will be held on Dec. 18, which it was agreed was to be a one session day.

CARD SHARP HELD

Charged With Trying to Extort Money—Threatens The Reporters

NEW YORK, Dec. 14.—Edward J. Naughton, much of whose life, Inspector John D. Coughlin says, has been passed in prisons of England, Holland and Australia, appeared before Magistrate Jean Norris in Tombs Court on a charge of extortion and gave vent to his displeasure by threatening to "get" newspaper reporters who expressed interest in the proceedings.

Naughton was arrested on the complaint of Dr. L. H. Jones, a dentist, with offices at 11 Wall street. It was charged that Naughton was striving to obtain \$11,000, alleged to have been won dishonestly in a card game, from

the dentist under pain of exposing a secret.

Inspector Coughlin explained that Naughton had been a frequent passenger aboard the trans-Atlantic liners and has been a successful frequenter of the card rooms. Since his arrival here last fall he has been arrested twice, having recently been released from custody in Pittsburgh.

He lived in the Hotel Majestic and entertained his steamship acquaintance, Dr. Jones, at the Park Lane restaurant. Magistrate Norris held him in \$20,000 bail, in default of which he was taken to the Tombs.

VICENTINI MATCHED.
NEW YORK, Dec. 15.—A challenger for the lightweight boxing title now held by Rocky Kanazawa, of Buffalo, will develop from the match here between Luis Vicentini, of Chile, and Phil McGraw, of Detroit, Tuesday, December 22. Vicentini once knocked out Kanazawa and McGraw holds a decision over Vicentini.

HOPPE HELPS SCHARFER.
NEW YORK, Dec. 15.—There is friendship in billiards. Willie Hoppe, who lost his 162 balk line title to Jake Schaefer in Chicago last winter, has agreed to assist his conqueror of that tournament, in preparing for Schaefer's forthcoming return match with Horamans of Belgium. Horamans, the present champion, recently defeated Schaefer in a challenge match.
