DR. MOSDELL ARRESTED FOR DEFAMATORY LIBEL

On June 5th a warrant was issued for the arrest of Dr. H. M. Mosdell at the instance of Sir John Crobie. The charge is one of defamatory libel and arises out of the publication of the infamous circular which was read at the meeting of the Liberal Conservative Party at the Star Movie on Saturday night. The warrant was not executed during the day, but at eight o'clock last night the accused surrendered himself at the police station and bail was applied for. This was granted in the sum of \$20,000.00, the accused in the sum of \$10,000.00 and Dr. Barnes and Mr. T. W. Sparkes in the sum of \$5,000.00 each. The preliminary hearing into the charge will begin on Monday afternoon at three o'clock.—Daily News.
