HAMILPON.—At a meeting isst week the provincial minimum wage board's proposal for a minimum wage for laundry workers and employes of dys works and dry cleaning establishments was unanimously endorsed by the employes' and employes' representatives. The minimum wage fixed by the board is \$12 a week for experienced workers, with slight reductions for apprentices. The minimum for inexperienced actualt workers' is \$10 for the first three months and \$11 for the second three months, after which \$12 is the minimum. For girls under 18 the minimum starting wage was fixed at \$3, with an increase of \$1 every three months until the \$12 minimum is reached. These wages apply only to Toronto. Dr. McMillan informed your correspondent that the minimum for the rest of the Province off Ontarto would be fixed at a later date.

CFRNING EMPLOYMENT OF WOMEN IN ONTARIO.

TORONTO.—The Ontario Minimum Wage Board recently adopted a regulations which have been approved by the Provincial Government. These regulations require all employers of female labor to keep a complete record of the names of workers and of the wages paid, such records to be kept open at all times to inspection by the board. Provision is also made for the payment by epecial permission of lower wages than the standard minimum in the case of handleapped workers, part time workers, apprentices, etc. The board has begun an investigation of women's wagee in laundries and dry works in the province.
