WASHINGTON, W.VA.

"Seattle people were on Monday night only afforded an opportunity of witnessing the University of Washington's rowing crew at its initial appearance for the season in home waters, but of seeing them win a notable victory from a crew of 22-oared men of the Portland Rowing Club on Lake Washington," says the Seattle Post-Intelligencer.

"The crew was a mile and a half long and the University crew won by four full lengths in the good time of eight minutes and fifty-eight seconds. Washington out-classed the Portland crew at every stage of the contest.

"The University men, four of whom were on the judges' boat and witnessed the race from start to finish, pronounced the performance of the Washington crew a masterpiece of the highest commendation, and Coach Knight himself, who has worked hard to develop the men who won Monday's victory, was more than gratified at the showing made."

"Portland had the outside course, there being no preference, as the lake was as calm as a millpond. Portland shot ahead fairly a half length on the start and maintained her lead for the first hundred yards. Just this side the University crew began to steadily gain, and at the end of the first quarter the shells measured noses. It was apparent from the start that Washington was rowing easier than her rival. Portland's stroke labored perceptibly, and his head described an arc with every stroke of his oar.

"At a point opposite the old pumping station Washington began to crawl away from Portland, at first almost imperceptibly, but later by bounds, and the University crew had a full length's lead before the two shells had moved two hundred yards further. At this point both boats took considerable wash from pleasure craft circling around the lake, but neither stroke appeared to be bothered. The University crew continued to increase its lead steadily until, at a point directly opposite Taylor's mill, the Washington boys had placed two good lengths between their boat and that of Portland's. From that point Portland labored hard with a much quicker stroke, but aside from shaking up a length on the first spur, the Portland crew's efforts availed them nothing."
