# THE HISTORY OF THE KNIFE, FORK AND SPOON

The fork is of a comparatively recent date. It made its first appearance toward the end of the tenth century. Peter Galveston, a favorite of King Edward II. had sixty-nine silver spoons and three forks. But the chronicle of that epoch adds that these forks were reserved for the sole use "to eat pears with."

Queen Clementine of Hungary, in 1328, had thirty spoons and one fork, and Queen Anne, of Bourbon had even a golden one, which was later inherited by Charles V. of France.
