BEER AND WINE PRICES REDUCED

Reductions in Beer Prices of 30 Cents per Dozen to Take Effect on April 1st - Wine Prices Also cut Within the Last Few Days.

Fredericton, N. B. - Beer and wine in New Brunswick have been reduced in price, according to an announcement made by the New Brunswick Liquor Control Board. The reduction in wine prices has already taken place but the new beer prices in the province came into effect on April 1st. The announcement of the New Brunswick Liquor Control Board states that from April 1st, beer, all classes of stock, are reduced 30 cents per dozen.

In connection with the reduction in wine prices, the Board has made even more drastic cuts in the price. Native wine that formerly sold for \$2.50 per bottle, has been decreased to \$2.25, while other brands of wine have been reduced from 90 cents per bottle to 85 cents and the reductions have all been along these lines.

This is the second price reduction announced by the New Brunswick Liquor Control Board in recent months, the prices of whiskey, gin and liquors having been reduced some months ago.

The League of Nations

Following is the oration delivered by JEAN-MARIE GAGNE, High School student, winner of the second prize at the Oratorical Contest held March the 25th:

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and gentlemen: The great war ended November the eleven hundred and eighteen. During the year that followed, the city of Paris was the focal point of the world's news for the reason that the peace treaty was being planned there and for the additional and greater reason that representatives from nearly all the peoples of the world were meeting there in a palace behind closed doors that were guarded by soldiers with fixed bayonets, and there without interference from outsiders under the duress of only their own conscience they were planning a scheme of international cooperation which is known to us as the League of Nations.

Those representatives of the world had just witnessed the closing of a great war. The end of a mad calamity. The termination of a struggle of hatred which had threatened the liberties of every land beneath the sun. They were determined to assist others, country after country were dragged into the vortex of that awful war. Those men had seen them in evidence that the war produced nothing of value. It accomplished nothing good. On the other hand it had ruined countless villages, it had destroyed monuments of antiquity which no man could rebuild. Milestones after Milestone of the progress of centuries had been obliterated. Fertile fields were reduced to arid lands. Peaceful valleys all over Europe were covered with the bleaching bones of the peaceful citizens. That is what the war did and it did more. It ruined the hopes and broke the hearts of the victims - it was the mothers and wives. The land was filled with children waiting for their fathers to return. With such evidence before them these men were convinced of the need of international cooperation. Not only to prevent war but to prevent vice and crime and to bring about causes of misery. Hence this League of Nations was formed with the following general aims: 1. Recognition of the Red Cross as a voluntary agency whose aim is the improvement of health, the prevention of disease, and the lessening of suffering throughout the world. 2. To bring amicable relations with existing international organizations. 3. To prevent disease and check epidemics which might cause the death of thousands of people. 4. To control the traffic in armaments and dangerous weapons. 5. By the Treaties many colonies and territories were taken from the defeated nations. They were not able to be admitted to the League of Nations. But they needed protection. They were given in tutelage to the more advanced nations. They were divided into groups according to their progress and geographical positions. The purpose of this plan was to refine these people by bringing them in contact with the more civilized world and then bring them to the League with the self-governing countries.

Such has been the record and the result of the earnest efforts of those men who gathered in Paris in the year 1919. The recent failure of the League to settle the dispute between the Chinese and the Japanese has subjected it to adverse criticism. It could not bring a plan of action against Japan, for whatever the plan might have been it would have endangered the peace of the nations as a whole and would have made China the next battlefield of the world. For this reason we are now confronted with a growing attitude to do away with this League of Nations. Some countries at first refused to enter it, others have resigned their position as members. Yet what are the prospects of peace. War clouds are gathering over many lands. The dark forces of ruin and desolation are fostered on many continents and civilization is at the parting of the ways. These nations who have not and who are not supposed to have grounds for hopes? They porting this league have given the present no substitute and seemed indifferent in allowing the people of the world to drift to that brink of ruin war. Not one beneficial result can be shown from all the wars of history. That Frankenstein monster has for centuries driven the burning iron of despair into helpless souls and covered country after country with graveyards. The graveyards of the youths from whose falling hands the torch of hope was thrown to us to preserve the peace of the world which we can bet do by supporting this League of Nations and the spirit of the League of Nations.
