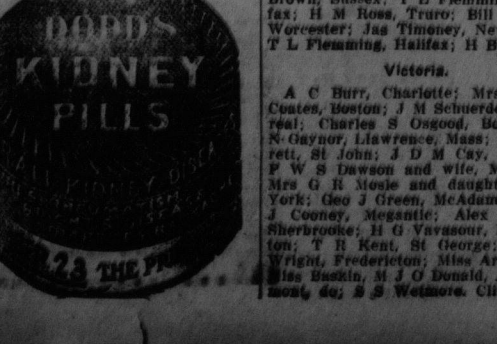

INFLUENCE OF POLITICS IS DISCARDED

New York, N. Y., June 21.—For a brief time today the stock market acted as if it had decided to divorce itself from politics and sit other things not exactly pertaining to financial conditions by steering an independent course.

That was in the first hour when the volume of business assumed respectable proportions and gains were general, though in no important instance much over a point. The advance embraced such a variety of issues as to convey an impression of investment demand. Then came the news that the convention at Chicago might not open until the coming week and the market beat a slow but sure retreat. By early afternoon nothing remained of the movement except a few sporadic advances in high priced non-speculative issues, such as American Tobacco and Texas Company. For the balance of the session the market settled down to a steady drift.

That the interstate commerce commission continues to exercise careful supervision over the coal companies and fuel carriers was demonstrated in a decision by that body granting "restitution" to one of the coal companies of coal mining companies for "excessive" and unreasonable charges by the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western Road.

Additional explanation of the week's rise in copper was furnished by statistics, which show a marked depletion in surplus stocks of the metal here and in Europe. Steel was well supported in connection with circumstantial rumors pointing to a further advance in higher prices for finished products in the course of the coming week.

The bond market moved steadily, with trading chances.

Total sales for value amounted to \$2,820,000. United States government bonds were unchanged on call.

New York, June 21.—The activity of yesterday's stock market inspired little fresh demand for stocks from outsiders, but the temper of professional sentiment was indicated by a further moderate advance of prices and the maintenance of a fair scale of activity throughout the session. It is true that when buying from this quarter ceased the market turned dull and unduly reactionary but there was no pressure to sell stocks on declines. Interest still centered upon the Chicago convention but there was an underlying confidence that further deliberation would result in nomination of a compromise candidate who would be acceptable to both factions and business interests as well. The strength of the commodity markets but something of a dampen upon bull enthusiasm but there was nothing to show general crop prospect had been impaired. The market is likely to remain comparatively narrow and in the hands of the professionals until the conventions are out of the way but there seems good reason to anticipate a more pronounced upward movement in the not distant future.
