NEW YORK, July 31. A Plymouth, Pa., despatch states there is the greatest suffering in the coal regions, the larger portion of the collieries having either stopped or are working on reduced time.

THE SECRETARY OF THE Treasury has decided that all lines of steamers plying between the United Provinces and places in the United States on the Atlantic coast, must conduct their business in all respects as other foreign going vessels are required to do.

THE SPANISH NAVY. Intimidations are thrown out by the Paris press that the advent of a German squadron in Spanish waters may cause the Spanish navy to pronounce in favor of the Carlists.

THE PARTS Le Temps reports that the issue of a loan of \$4,000,000 for the Carlists has been commenced, and that out of the proceeds so far realized, \$3,000,000 was forwarded to Spain to-day.

THE FRENCH ASSEMBLY, yesterday, after an exciting debate, voted a recess from August 6 to November 14.

A motion to raise the state of siege was rejected, 282 yeas to 365 nays.

During the debate the Marquis de Franca, legitimist, declared his right and duty to do everything in his power to re-establish the monarchy.

This caused great excitement, and the Chamber of Deputies was adjourned.

Gen. De Cussy, Vice-President of the Chamber of Deputies, declared that the Government would seek with firmness and impartiality to make its powers respected by all parties.

NEW YORK, Aug 1. THE QUEBEC GOVERNMENT. Mr. Irvine has resigned his portfolio in the Quebec Local Government.

Other defections are said to have taken place. It is reported the Premier will resign, and that Mr. Joly will be called on to form a new Government.
