The regular examinations for admission to the Freshman class will take place on Tuesday, October 4th, beginning at 9 a. m.

Candidates for Matriculation will be required to pass a satisfactory examination in the following subjects:

I. LATIN.—Cæsar, Gallic War, Book I, or Books II and III; Virgil, Æneid, Book I; Cicero, two Orations against Catiline or the Manilian Law; Latin Grammar (Harkness' is preferred); Smith's Principia Latina, Part IV, Exs. 1—25, or the equivalent.

II. (a) GREEK.—Dr. Smith's Initia Greea, Part I; Xenophon, Anabasis, Book I, or Book IV; Greek Grammar, (Hadley's or Goodwin's is preferred) or—

(b) FRENCH.—Grammar as in Otto's French Grammar. A thorough knowledge of the conjugations is especially insisted on Translation, La Belle Nivernaise, (Daudet), or an equivalent.

III. MATHEMATICS.—Arithmetic; Algebra to the end of Quadratic Equations; Geometry, as in Hamblin Smith, Books I-IV (inclusive), or the equivalent thereof.

IV. ENGLISH.—Grammar; writing from dictation; a short composition upon a subject drawn from one of the following works: Shakespeare's Merchant of Venice; Longfellow's Evangeline; Scott's Lay of the Last Minstrel. The composition must be exact in expression, in division into paragraphs, and in punctuation and spelling.

V. HISTORY AND GEOGRAPHY.—Condin and British History; Smith's History of Greece; Smith's History of Rome; Geography of Greece, Italy and Asia Minor; Modern Geography. Graduate Seminary of presentation scribed for many be admino candidate
