Phoenix Council Votes Money for First Class Exhibit.

Mr. Cornish, of Greenwood, Will Come to Nelson in Charge of it—Welcome for Spokane Excursionists.

Phoenix, Aug. 30.—At its meeting held last evening the municipal council of this city appropriated the sum of \$75 for a contribution to the fair. The exhibit will be in charge of G. W. Cornish, a resident of Greenwood, who was appointed to visit the several camps of the district and gather a representative exhibit of ores from the most important and prominent mines of the Boundary. Mr. Cornish will also accompany the exhibit to both Nelson and Spokane, for the purpose of giving information to the thousands who will attend and show interest in the Boundary.

Mr. Cornish states that he is meeting with considerable encouragement and support in the effort to have the first complete and representative mineral exhibit that has been gathered together or sent out of the Boundary for the past several years. Those who are encouraging the idea in a financial way believe that the effort will worth the time and cost required.

BRYAN ALMOST MOBBED

FRIENDLY CROWD CARRIES HIM OFF HIS FEET.

OLD "16 TO 1" GETS A ROYAL WELCOME IN NEW YORK.

New York, Aug. 30.—Mr. Bryan's entry into New York this afternoon was a series of ovations beginning with his landing at the Battery at 4 o'clock and reaching an early climax when he arrived at the Victoria hotel an hour and 15 minutes later. Here the home-coming Nebraska was fairly mobbed by the thousands of persons who had gathered outside the entrance and hundreds who had forced their way into the corridors. Finally an entrance was effected by the police and Bryan reached the lobby stairs. He was called upon for a speech and then the crowd surged about him, cheering lustily all the while. Mr. Bryan lifted his hand and secured silence. "Ladies and gentlemen," he began: "I believe that later in the evening is the time for me to make a speech, and you must not expect one now. I am trying to get home, and I have been travelling so much of late that for the life of me I can hardly tell where home is."

In Washington," called an enthusiastic auditor. "The White House," shouted another. "And we are going to put you there," yelled a third. Then everyone cheered, and Mr. Bryan smiled indulgently. "I thought home was in Nebraska," he continued. "Only until 1906," shouted the crowd. "I'm not in Missouri," added Mr. Bryan, amid laughter. "I've about come to the conclusion that if I find fields like this everywhere, I don't care where it is. Soon I am going to take another course in college, for at a re-

cent gathering in London, where several languages were spoken, I felt constrained to make excuses because I could speak but one, but I would have to know every language in the world to tell you how much I thank you."

Mr. Bryan then stepped down from the stairs to shake hands with a few personal friends who crowded about him. This was the signal for a general rush and the Nebraska was almost swept out of the Twenty-seventh street entrance of the hotel before the score of policemen stationed in the lobby could stem the tide. Finally order was established and the impromptu procession proceeded. Several thousand persons passed in line and Mr. Bryan shook hands with them all. The reception lasted for more than an hour.

Mr. Bryan was landed at the Battery from the steam yacht Illini, on board of which he spent last night. Thousands of persons were waiting in Battery park on piers and every vantage point along the water front. Every window in the lowering skyscrapers near the Battery was filled with eager faces. Flags were flying everywhere. At the naptha launch of the Illini put out from the yacht just before 4 o'clock with Mr. Bryan on board, the first and only boat and other crafts set up a screeching of vari-toned whistles, which continued long after Mr. Bryan had stepped out upon the yacht landing and had been cordially greeted and given the freedom of the city by acting-mayor McGowan. Gathered at the Battery to extend a welcome to the home-coming, were democratic front all sorts of the south and north. The party's national convention could not have brought together a more representative assembly. Governor Folk of Missouri; senator Bailey, of the democratic committee; members of that committee from a score of states and the visiting governors were among the first to extend greetings. Mr. Bryan, governor Folk and others stopped for a moment to oblige the half hundred men with cameras who had gained entrance with the police lines. All smiled pleasantly as the 50 shutters snapped. There was no delay in reaching the twenty or more carriages and the drive up town followed.

NEW C. P. R. FAST TRAIN STARTS ON ITS JOURNEY.

INTENSE HEAT MAKES ENGLAND ROLL UP ITS SLEEVES.

Quebec, Aug. 31.—The new transatlantic line of the Canadian Pacific railway, "The Overseas Limited," was inaugurated this morning and the event aroused considerable interest in the ancient capital. The new train, made up of eight cars (six sleepers, diner and mail car, all newly equipped) was at the wharf awaiting the arrival of the Empress of Ireland, which arrived in port at 2:30 this morning. Among the passengers on board were Hamar Greenwood, M. P., Allan Baker, M. P., both Canadian members of the British house of commons; Sir Daniel Mann, lieutenant-governor of Manitoba; Mr. Adolphe Caron; E. G. Swift, manager of Park, Davis & Co., the famous drug firm of Canada and the United States; Sir Edward Fleming, and Charles Marconi with his wife. The passengers disembarked about 8 o'clock, their baggage having been transferred, and at 9 o'clock the train pulled out for the station amid the ringing cheers of a large crowd of people. Every effort was made to prevent delays on the journey and officials are confident that the train will reach the coast in 96 hours. George Ham, of the C. P. R., is going right through to the coast on "The Overseas Limited," and will spend a fortnight's holidays there.

Edmonton, Aug. 31.—Approximately speaking the assessed valuation of Edmonton last year will be \$17,000,000 against \$6,000,000 last year. On this valuation, the rate will be about 10 mills.

Omaha, Neb., Aug. 31.—Edward Rose, proprietor and editor of the Omaha Bee and prominently identified with the political, financial and business affairs of Omaha and the state of Nebraska for forty years, was found dead in his district court room number on the third floor of the Bee building early today. It is supposed that he sat down on a bench in the court room, fell asleep, and died of heart failure.

Peterboro, Ont., Aug. 31.—W. B. Kelly, of Bridgewater, a prominent lumberman of this district, is dead as a result of injuries sustained by being thrown from his buggy in a street collision about a week ago. Mr. Kelly was seventy years of age.

London, Aug. 31.—The last day of August is breaking all heat records in this country. The official instruments at 2 p. m. today registered 91 degrees in the shade and 122 degrees in the sun. A number of heat prostrations in the streets were reported. The heat in England in general is so intense that in some places the judges presiding over the assizes have been obliged to be dispensing justice in their shirtsleeves.

Kingston, N. Y., Aug. 31.—Early today three men and a woman, all masked, entered the postoffice at Highland and blew open the safe, secured \$500 in money and in stamps and escaped in an automobile, when residents, who had been aroused, came on the scene.

Portland, Maine, Aug. 31.—The town of Fryburg is reported in danger from fire which has already destroyed the Oxford hotel and two residences. The

building containing the telephone exchange was burning when communication with the town from here was interrupted.

Speaking to his motion, Mr. Ford urged that the previous meeting was not a representative one in any sense. The notice calling the meeting had been given and it was to discuss the labor question, whereas the few who had arranged the matter knew very well that it was the Chinese question that was to be brought up. At that meeting the question had been discussed and the resolution passed had been urged from a narrow and entirely selfish point. It was extreme to urge the admission of the Chinese, their true interests and those of their children all pointed to the exclusion of the Chinese for all time. The bona fide filer of the bill was represented in the resolution passed. The matter had been most unfairly sprung on that meeting and had been rushed through by a small majority, many of those present not voting at all. The present gathering was a fairly representative one and knew what it was going to vote on. If this meeting declared in favor of the Chinese, the speaker would bow to the vote. Turning to his own motion, Mr. Ford said he was going to vote in favor of no objection to be taken to them. He was an Englishman, bred on the soil and he knew that there were thousands of men in England today ready to come here if they were properly approached and had the situation clearly explained to them. The ordinary worker of the soil in England would not be so stupid as to believe that the countrymen made the best workers in the world. He was satisfied that men could get it if they went the right way about it to get their (Applause).

That Chinese Tale.—Mr. J. S. H. Matson, manager of the colonist, has telegraphed a Nelson paper that the statement that the Chinese would not be allowed to enter the colony was a malicious lie. He adds that Mr. Galleley of the Bank of Montreal and Mr. Gibb of the Imperial bank, both of Victoria, are the only persons who would not be allowed to enter the colony. He adds that both are prepared to make affidavit to that effect. This denial is excellent so far as it goes; but does it not leave the question of the right of the Chinese to enter the colony open to doubt? Matson's word, as any statement made by Messrs. Galleley and Gibb will be accepted without an affidavit as readily as one of their bank notes, while the government is not prepared to accept the word of the Chinese. The colonist is a reputable journal of great age and respectability and much to be relied upon for the truth. It is certain that the winter wheat lands will not require so much water as spring wheat.

Mr. Pearce referred to the marvellous growth now taking place in Calgary. The census returns look on at rather misleading inasmuch as a very large number of people are located just outside the city limits. To these east of these limits the Calgary brewery has a large establishment employing 150 hands. P. Burns is also in the same quarter, building a huge five storey cold storage structure, and building it with cement. The Calgary Milling company is erecting a 1000 barrel mill and the Bruckman-Ker people are arranging for the erection of a large cereal mill. The firm of W. H. Chushing has also just purchased a high figure a considerable acreage outside the corporation limits for the purpose of growing wheat.

Asked as to the immigration into B.C. from the plains, Mr. Pearce said it would continue steadily. The older people who had made money were handing their place on to the younger generation and looked for something to occupy their time and the tendency would be for large numbers of them to settle in the best and most fertile tracts of land and embark in horticulture. "Of course, I look for more of such men to come from Manitoba where the climate is severe."

Pathetic Words of Girl Who Tried to Kill Herself.

"Nobody cares for me, and I want to die," was the statement made by 16-year-old Maudie Parrott at Ladysmith, after she had with great difficulty been dragged from the inlet by Mr. Leonard Ingham and placed in a row boat from which she had without any previous warning jumped.

The boat party consisted of the Misses McMillan and Miss Parrott, Messrs. Ingham, Morgan and Hughes. They had spent a pleasant evening on the inlet, and were returning home about ten o'clock. When they neared the Transfer wharf Miss Parrott stood up in the boat and was warned by her companions that she should keep still as she might upset the boat. One of the girls invited her to take a seat beside her, which, with apparent reluctance, she finally did. However the temptation to put an end to her life was too strong and for fully breasting her hand through the water while singing, the girl suddenly stood up and without a moment's hesitation she attempted to drown herself. She expressed herself as very sorry that she had not succeeded, and stated that she would not accomplish her purpose until she had had trouble at her home which is in Nanaimo, and her "mother had put her out."

C. P. R. COMMISSIONER TALKS OF WORK ACCOMPLISHED.

RATES CHARGED WILL BE LOWEST ON THE CONTINENT.

Grand Forks, Aug. 30.—W. Pearce, C.P.R. assistant commissioner of B.C. lands, was a visitor to the city this week and left for Calgary direct. Pearce is a pretty familiar knowledge of southern B.C., although he has not been in the Boundary since the famous scrap between the C.P.R. and Great Northern forces near Midway about a year ago. He was looking up survey matters connected with various work of the C.P.R. lands, and his visit was a brief one, lasting less than a day. He particularly dry time it was natural that the conversation should turn on irrigation matters. Mr. Pearce has been very intimately associated with the big irrigation scheme in the Northwest now being put into operation by the C.P.R. and gave the following figures for the work accomplished to date.
