Regulations for Taking the Vote on April 18

THE Parliament of Canada has recently passed a bill regulating the taking of the vote on the Referendum in Ontario on April 18. The points to remember are as follows:

1. Every British subject by birth or naturalization, man or woman, resident in the Dominion of Canada one year previous to February 1, 1921, and resident in the Province of Ontario for two months previous to same date, is entitled to vote, unless otherwise disqualified.
2. Voters' Lists used in the last provincial referendum are the lists to be used in this Referendum, subject to revision. Every voter in an urban polling division must be on the list, and will presumably be on the list only in the division in which he resides.
3. In incorporated cities and towns of 1,000 population or over, arrangements will be made for receiving applications from any who are not now on the list on March 29 to April 4 inclusive—except Sunday—when for six clear days officers will sit to receive such applications.
4. In rural polling divisions the voter must be either on the list or be put upon it as a resident and be vouched for as such by another resident.
5. Both affirmative and negative sides have the right to select scrutineers.
6. Women have the right to vote.

80-MILE GALE HITS NEW YORK, KILLING TWO

Temperature Changes From 78 to 37 in a Short Time.

NEW YORK, March 28.—An eighty-mile gale sweeping down New York late this afternoon tore off roofs, uprooted trees, caused accidents which have resulted in at least two deaths and brought a touch of real winter. The wind was accompanied by a drop in temperature from 78 at 2 p.m. to 37 degrees at 10 o'clock, with indications of a further drop to 30 degrees by morning.

The weather bureau declared the gale to be mostly local in character, caused by the heat of yesterday and this morning, but partly of a general storm in the east. While not officially recognized as a hurricane, persons in the sections to the north of the city declared they saw a small funnel-shaped cloud moving away before a squall. Reports from Plainfield, N. J., declare a hurricane cut a half-mile path through the western part of that town. Dropped Rapidly.

The temperature dropped rapidly with a heavy downfall of rain, coming on the heels of the squall. Later in the evening it turned into sleet and hail. The deaths reported were those of a Brooklyn child playing in a frame structure once used as a motion picture house and an unidentified woman struck by an automobile. The picture house collapsed when what spectators described as a "whirling dervish" struck it and reduced it to a pile of debris. Firemen worked three hours before the child's body was recovered.

Planned Under Auto.—The woman was found pinned under the rear wheel of a heavy automobile, and the police believe she walked into it while temporarily blinded by the storm. She was instantly killed. Brooklyn was struck hardest by the wind, and it was there the greater part of the damage was done. The walls of a synagogue under construction in Flatbush were blown to the ground. Reports from Somerville, N. J., told of the wrecking of a building sixty feet high. The structure was almost razed to the ground, and bricks were blown considerable distances.

A number of minor accidents from flying objects were reported and several persons were struck by automobiles unseen in the flying dust and rain.

BIG LAKE BOATS ARE BEING REPAIRED

GODERICH, March 28.—A gang of 40 men is now working on the steamers in the harbor here, repairing and fitting them up for the coming season. The most extensive repairs are being done to the steamers Martian and Midland King.

The engineers have all arrived, and if all the necessary repairs are completed in time navigation may open about April 5.

The annual excursion of the steamer Greyhound, which runs from Detroit every season, is announced for June 13.

ALFONSO IS MUCH BETTER

MADRID, March 28.—King Alfonso is entirely recovered from his recent indisposition and held a conference with his ministers relative to the reopening of Parliament.

LABOR REFUSES TO AFFILIATE WITH LENINE

Proposal of Extremists Turned Down by a Huge Majority.

VOTE WAS 521 TO 97

Minority May Secede From the Party and Take Own Course.

SOUTHPORT, England, March 28.—The Independent Labor party, in conference here today, rejected by an overwhelming majority a proposal to accept Lenin's 21 conditions for affiliation with the Third Internationale of Moscow. The minority report favored acceptance and this element may secede from the party.

The Independent Labor party has for the second time in succession defeated the extremist section, wishing to affiliate with the Third Internationale. Fifty branches of the party supported the Moscow conditions, and there were some 100,000 votes in the convention, but when the decision was a card vote the Moscow proposal was defeated, 521 to 97.

May Be Significant.—The Independent Labor party is the extreme wing of the Labor party, and today's vote is interesting in connection with Mr. Lloyd George's speech on March 23, accusing the Labor party of revolutionary proclivities. This speech has been the subject of much excited criticism, and on the Labor side has been interpreted as preparing the ground for a general election, and indicating that the prime minister has resolved to throw in his lot with the Unionist party and become its titular leader.

It was reported today that some of the prime minister's close friends had represented to him the indifference of his speech, in view of the heavy polls the Labor party had recently achieved at a by-election, and urged him to endeavor to explain it away.

May Cause Split.—The indications are that today's vote will lead to a split in the Independent Labor party. The group favoring Moscow met here tonight to discuss the situation, and, it is understood, resolved to secede from the party unless the conference decides tomorrow to remain outside the Second Internationale. There will probably be consultations with the local branches, however, before the final decision.

Among the incidents at the conference was an attack on Mrs. Philip Snowden, the militant suffragette, owing to her denunciation of Bolshevism after her visit to Russia. But on the card she was nominated to represent the Independent Labor party on the executive of the National Labor party by a vote of 235 to 191.

GETS DIVORCE, BUT MUST GIVE CASH TO WIFE

Former Tilbury Woman, Mother of Sixteen, Admits Desertion.

DETROIT, March 28.—Peter Bruseau, aged 69, who spent most of his life on a farm at Tilbury, Ont., but who is now selling coal in Detroit, was granted a divorce by Judge Goff today from the wife he married in 1876, and who bore him 16 children.

Bruseau charged desertion, which has continued since 1907.

Mrs. Bruseau, 63 years old, whose appearance showed the result of years of hard labor on the farm, made no denial of her husband's charge of desertion. She admitted she left him in 1907 and remained away. She also told of two previous desertions, but said she came back for the sake of the children.

Mrs. Bruseau charged that her husband whipped her many times, and had driven her from home more than once, compelling her to sleep in the fields. She denied her husband's charge that she had attacked him.

Mrs. Bruseau also charged non-support, claiming her husband had dissipated his earnings, and when she attempted to raise a garden to aid her children he turned cattle on it and it was destroyed.

Bruseau was granted a divorce on the understanding that he give his wife two-thirds of the cash he has in a Canadian bank.

WILL BE GASSED WHILE ASLEEP

Hanging and Shooting of Condemned Men To Be Abolished.

CARSON CITY, Nevada, March 28.—A bill providing for the use of lethal gas in executing the death penalty in Nevada was signed here today by Governor Boyle.

Signing of the bill abolishes other forms of capital punishment in the state. Hitherto, condemned men had the choice between hanging or shooting. Nevada is believed to be the first state to make gas the means of capital punishment.

Under the new law the death warrant must designate a week within which the execution must take place. This week must be not less than sixty nor more than ninety days after the date of the judgment.

The law calls for a suitable cell for inflicting the penalty where gas is used, and provides that the warden, a competent physician and six other citizens must witness the execution.

The bill gives no details concerning the cell, but sponsors for the bill said it was understood that it was intended that it should be air tight, fitted with windows of thick glass and equipped with valves to admit air.

It was planned that when the condemned man was placed in the cell, the valves would be closed and others, admitting lethal gas, be opened, life being taken without the prisoner's awakening.

Cold Dip Caused \$11,000,000 Loss

Fruit Crop Ruined in Oklahoma by Freezing Temperatures.

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., March 28.—Oklahoma sustained a loss of approximately \$11,000,000 when 75 per cent of the fruit crop of the state was ruined last night by freezing temperatures.
