

PLAN TO INTEREST
DISTRICT BOYS AND
GIRLS IN LIVE STOCKPure-Bred Animals To Be
Provided by Special
Committee.

PRIZES ARE OFFERED

Middlesex County Branch of
Agricultural Department
Takes Action.

By means of a scheme which has been arranged, the boys and girls of London district are to be afforded the opportunity of securing the foundation of a good herd of pure-bred live stock by becoming members of the local live stock club.

The London District Live Stock Club is being organized by the Middlesex County branch of the Ontario Department of Agriculture.

The primary object of the formation of this club is to encourage young people on the farms to take a greater interest in good live stock and by so doing raise the standard of the animals in this district.

One of the great advantages of becoming a member is that it provides a unique scheme of securing a well-bred stock at a reasonable rate, and parents are invited to encourage their children to take part in this work.

The initial outlay will not be great, and arrangements have been made with a banking corporation for securing credit loans at the rate of 6 per cent.

As all the animals will be insured for their full value the risk will be slight. London district is particularly well adapted for the raising of pure-bred live stock, and by associating themselves with this movement the members of the club will have at their command all the latest information on feeding, marketing and breeding so as to secure the best results, and will be enabled to acquire reliable knowledge as to the cost of production.

Those eligible for membership in the club are boys and girls living in London district between the ages of 10 and 19 years, providing they can satisfy the committee of management of their ability and willingness to care for, house and feed the animals.

In order to safeguard the interests of members a purchasing committee, including successful breeders of the kind of stock to be bought, will be appointed; but any father may select an animal for his child, subject to the approval of the committee. Animals may be purchased from a parent by a child under the same conditions.

TROOPS RESTORE
ORDER AFTER A

Three companies of Ohio National Guardsmen, consisting of 100 officers and men, under command of Lieut.-Col. H. D. Horner, were on duty today, with headquarters at the city hall. Machine guns are mounted on the roof of the city hall, and the militia are under arms, ready to answer riot calls.
