DEMOCRACY VERSUS PROHIBITION

To The Editor: The controversy between Mr. J. McKay and Mr. E. D. Heist and others shows a lack of true democratic principles, dealing entirely with effects, and ignoring the cause, without which the matter cannot be settled.

In order to get at the foundation, we must realise that humanity is responsible for the ase of everything in nature beneath it. Man is possessed of three planes black sheets and a lamp with a greeny-blue shade"

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Man is responsible for the production of all liquors, which is really the Soul of the vegetable kingdom, exwhich is really the Soul of the vegetable kingdom, ex-tracted and fermented to preserve it from decay, and must remain where man so orders. It cannot become other than a vegetable product, is not responsible for its use; hence cannot be evil or create evil.

Therefore man is entirely responsible for the use he makes of it, and he must be beld responsible for any evil by its excessive use that may accrue.

Now let us see how it mixes with Democracy, of

which we hear so much recently. The defectacy we get is shallow and not substance as is apparent to any Essential Democracy guarantees to every human

being the right to develop his or her personality under normal conditions; teaches each individual to govern the affections with moderation; guides and helps those who cannot; holds responsible every individual according to the development of the talents each person possesses. Teaches them they are immortal and will be held responsible on each plane of consciousness, as they develop.

Inscribed on the banner of Democracy is the "Fatherhood of God and the Brotherhood of Man." That individuals are in all stages of development from the babe to the adept. As it would fill a large volume to properly describe only the fundamental principles of democracy, I will trust to the intelligence of the reader to add to their state of discernment. Let us see how true Democracy would treat the

roblem. The first consideration would be to find the status of the individual and apply the Law to each case. Surely the individual of low mentality would not be responsible equally with one of high mentality, who could govern the affections and realised that the abuse of any talent or affection must be fully met by the law of compensation. The latter class must also realise that their brothers beneath them have rights to respect and a reasonable degree of freedom given them to develop normally. The individual who cannot restrain his affections should be directed by those above them, with discretion and moderation. The babe at the nother's breast surely has a right to be properly ted and cared for and all its affections trained as it devel-

ops from stage to stage of growth. Nature has given t laws to manifest its desires and those desires should be promptly met. The child that is neglected and improperly cared for is sure to cause trouble in one way other, and large numbers die through the ignorance of parents, who are responsible for their development. Simply by not attending to the wants of the babe at the proper time. The same principles apply to those who are only in the first stages of human Evolution. If the affections demand spirituous liquors there is a Prohibition.

The analogy between the babe in physical form and the babe in human evolution is a fair one. Nature provides the nourishment for the babe by distilling its food through the mother, and should the mother provide a surplus, and allow the babe to consume more than it required with the result that it became. Would she in order to correct the trouble, withhold its food or would she use her judgment and not allow the babe ore than sufficient for its health? The mother who would be so inhumane as to deprive her babe of its natural food would be a criminal and should be treated as such. What about the Prohibition who would deprive a fellow whose affections require its nourishment just as surely as the babe, and is it not just as

Will Dr. Heist give a logical answer or apologise for his illogical deductions? To my mind this is what true Democracy would

with the liquor question and it would go further. It would tell us that very many cases of drunkenness are caused by a violation of sexual laws in various ways.

If Sex Hygiene was taught in our schools and the subject was properly and seriously impressed on the minds of the young, there would not be such deprayed drunkards and other dope fiends.

Dr. Heist tells us doctors regard Prohibition tavorably. If they could dispense with their professional etiquette and advise the public on sex problems, it would go a long way to establish true Democracy.

Recent events in our city surely proves what I have pointed out. Instead of removing the cause, Prohibitionists are only adding fuel to the fire, as the man who should have his drink is not going to permit others prescribe for him when he realises the other fellow is using and abusing his affections in some other way

and is permitted his freedom.

We hear much about Boisheviki and their doing but they are no worse than the man who deliberately attempts to force them to accept principles that deprives

them of normal development.

If people would think as individuals and weigh
the principles as a personal matter, there would not be the extreme agitations so prevalent. People are swayed by some person or persons who are, to say the least, fanatics on some subject and they do things they

would not as persons acting for themselves.
