### Sent to Reformatory.

The charge of non support against Jack Thiel was disposed of in Police Court. The accused was sent to the Reformatory for three months.

### Again Adjourned.

In order to enable the accused, William Delaney and Harold Armistage, to see what arrangements they can make with the publication houses for which it is alleged they claimed they were selling periodicals, the charge of vagrancy against each was again adjourned in Police Court this morning. The defendants are endeavoring to see whether the publication concerns will accept the subscriptions they received.

### A New Commercial School For London.

Plans for the erection of a new commercial school in connection with the Collegiate Institute in London, Ont., are before the Board of Education. It was announced by Chairman A. A. Lanford of the Commercial Advisory Committee. The present building is inadequate for the increasing demands put upon it. The new school, which will be up to the minute in every detail, will cost in the neighborhood of \$40,000, if the present plans are carried out. The old building will be torn down and replaced by the new one.

### Double Platoon at Guelph.

The estimates for the Guelph Fire and Light and Water Committee, made public, made provision for the institution of the double platoon system at the firehall. The total amount asked by this committee will be slightly more than \$41,000, which is an increase of more than \$10,000 over last year. The greater portion of this is an account of the salaries for seven men who will be required in order to put the two-platoon system into operation, and the increase in salaries granted to all the members of the brigade.

### New Hydro Pipe Line at the Falls in Use.

Water is flowing into the thirteen and a half-foot Hydro pipe line through Victoria Park Niagara Falls, which will give 20,000 additional horsepower to the Hydro. The water is being run in gradually for fear of something going wrong. The pipe is of wood and more than a mile long. Should everything go all right, it is expected water from the new pipe will be running one of the machines at the Ontario Power plant of the Hydro on Monday officials of the company said yesterday.

### Manslaughter Charge.

William Boldue, who ran down the late Miss Mabel Tataum with his automobile at the corner of King and Church streets, Galt, was placed under arrest. He appeared before Police Magistrate J. R. Blake of Galt at the town hall. A charge of manslaughter was laid against him by Crown Attorney D. S. Bowlby. Magistrate remanded the prisoner for a week, when the case will be heard before him in the Galt Police Court. Boldue was allowed out on a \$500 bail.

### Stratford Hospital.

The annual report of Stratford hospital contained the following summary of year's work; the number of patients cared for was 631. The total receipts received from patients themselves was \$16,504.82 or about \$500 more than in 1917. Of this sum ward rates produced \$14,564.89 operating fees, \$1,389.25; pupil nurses on special cases \$145.75, and board of outside graduate nurses on special cases \$405.

Subsequently he is to get to France as soon as possible and endeavor to get into the flying corps, and finally after prolonged efforts, he succeeded. For six months he flew over the German lines and did valuable and heroic work in observation, which was specially mentioned in official dispatches. As is his custom, Lt. Ziegler is very modest in his recalling of the experiences he had.

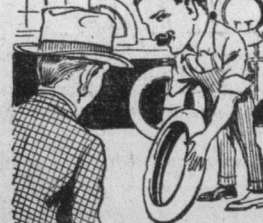
## TOMATO CROP GONE
