

Munro, a native of Glasgow. B. in North Sherbrooke, Lanark, Ont., Feb. 10, 1839, his early yrs. were spent on his father's farm. Afterwards, he was successively a dry goods clk. and a sch. teacher (2nd class grade "A" cert. from Normal Sch., 1862), and in 1869 he graduated M.D., C.M., at McGill Univ., being valedictorian of his year. Thereafter, he practised at Seaforth, where he was one of the leaders in his profession, till Apl., 1896, when he removed to Brooklyn, N.Y. Visiting Scot., 1882, he was admitted a L.R.C.P. and L.M. (Edin.), and in 1896 passed all examinations before the N. Y. Med. Bd. While in Scot., he made a tour through Ayrshire, visiting particularly the haunts of his favourite poet, Burns, as a result of which he published, 1884, a descriptive volume entitled, "The Land of Burns," a 2nd ed. of which he is now preparing for publication. Dr. C. has long been noted as a temp. advocate. He has filled various local positions, including the Presidency of the Mech. Inst., and of the Huron Med. Assn., and the Chieftainship of the Caledonian Soc., and has long been identified with the Odd-fellows, Foresters, Templars, Chosen Friends and Masons. He is a Lib. in politics, and at the Dom. g. e., 1887, unsuccessfully contested South Huron in that interest. He has written largely for the med., as well as for the general press, and in 1892, received the thanks of the Duke of Argyll for defending the memory of one of his ancestors through the press. In addition to being a Lib., he is a pronounced free trader. In religion, he is a Presb. He m. May, 1872, Jane, dau. of John Laird, Haysville, Ont.—669 *Leonard St., Brooklyn, N. Y.*

**CAMPBELL, Rev. John L.** (Bapt.), is the s. of Peter Campbell, by his wife, Flora McLean, and was b. at Dominionville, Glengarry, Ont., Jan. 14, 1849. Ed. at Woodstock Coll., and at Toronto Univ. (B.A., 1883), he was ordained to the ministry, Aug., 1868. He was for some yrs.

Secy. to the Bapt. Foreign Mission. Soc. of Ont. and Quebec, and, after declining re-election to that office, was unanimously elected Secy. of the Bapt. Home Mission Soc. of Ont., which he continued to hold up to his leaving Can., Feb., 1884, to become pastor of his present charge, the Lexington Av. Bapt. Ch., N. Y. city, one of the largest and most prosperous congregations in the U.S. He is also a mem. of the Bapt. Home Mission Soc., of the N. Y. City Bapt. City Mission Soc., of the Bapt. Orphanage Soc., of the Bapt. Home for the Aged, and a trustee of Rutgers Female Coll. Besides various contributions to the periodical press, he is the author of a volume: "Heavenly Recognition, and other Sermons" (1895). He received the degree of D.D., from Central Univ., Iowa, 1894. **CAMPBELL, Capt. Kenneth Jeffrey Rankin**, late Suffolk Regt., is the s. of Archibald Campbell, Prothonotary, Quebec, by his wife, the late Isabella Campbell Prior, authoress of "The Inner Life," "Rough and Smooth," and other works. B. in Quebec, Aug. 17, 1863, he was ed. at the High Sch. in that city, and at the Royal Mil. Coll., Kingston. Leaving the latter institution, without completing his course, he enlisted in the army, 1883. He was gazetted lieut., Lancaster Regt., Aug. 18, 1886, was transferred to the 7th Dragoon Gds., July, 1887, and, later, to the 6th Dragoon Gds., ("Carabiniers"), and was promoted capt., Aug. 23, 1895. Capt. C. was seconded in his rank, and apptd. Adj. to the Gold Coast Constabulary, 1891. Later, in the same year, he became Depty. Commr. and Vice-Consul at Bonny River, Niger Coast Protectorate. In 1894 he was mentioned in Admiral Bedford's despatches in connection with the operations before Benin, and in recognition of his gallant conduct, received the Distinguished Service
