He verified what I already knew, viz., that the condition is more or less dependent on my general health, and that with an improvement in my general condition, I can look for an amelioration of the paralysis. I don't think I mentioned to you before that so far it has affected my right arm and leg, and I fear makes me look rather crippled when I get about. Beyond the inconvenience that it causes me in locomotion and picking things up with my right hand, there is nothing to it, only I fear it is much more distressing to other people than it is to myself. I enjoyed the drive downtown and I don't think the trip did me any harm.

The first news we have received in a long while is that contained in your thing message received this morning, viz., that you expect to be with us in Denver on January 23rd. I need scarcely tell you what a happiness this will be.
