It must-and does-strike the average Chatham householder that the method of raising the price of bread.

If the exigencies of business demanded an increase, it would surely have been wiser to have placed the price a cent per two-pound loaf higher. By the present action, however, of reducing the 2-lb. loaf to 11-2 lbs., the price is virtually raised over quarter of the original price.

Owing to the fact that the price of flour has not risen, this action by the bakers is very liable to tempt outside competition.
