

- live stock, carts and other vehicles, and agricultural implements in use by the settler at least one year before his removal to Canada, not to include machinery or articles imported for use in any manufacturing establishment, or for sale, provided that any dutiable article entered as settlers' effects may not be so entered unless brought with the settler on his first arrival, and shall not be sold or otherwise disposed of without payment of duty until after two years actual use in Canada; provided, also, that under the regulations made by the Minister of Customs, live stock, when imported into Manitoba or the Northwest Territories by intending settlers, shall be free, until otherwise ordered by the Governor in Council.
- Steel of No. 20 gauge and thinner, but not thinner than 30 gauge, to be used in the manufacture of corset steels, clock springs, and shoe shanks, when imported by manufacturers, such articles for use in their factories.
- Steel imported for use in the manufacture of skates.
- Steel in sheets not less than 11 nor over 18 wire gauge, costing not less than \$75 per ton of 2,240 lbs, when imported by manufacturers of shovels and spades, for use exclusively in such manufactures in their own factories.
- Steel railway bars or rails, not including tram or street rails.
- Steel for saws and straw cutters, cut to shape but not further manufactured.
- Spelter, in blocks and pigs.
- Spurs and stiltis, used in the manufacture of earthenware.
- Sulphate of iron (copperas.)
- Sulphur, in rolls or flour.
- Tagging metal, plain, japanned or coated, in coils not over 1½ in. in width, when imported by manufacturers of shoe and corset laces for use in factories.
- Tails, undressed.
- Tampico, white and black.
- Tanners' bark.
- Tar (pine), in packages of not less than 15 gallons each.
- Tea, except as provided by Sec. 10 of this Act.
- Terra Japonica.
- Teasals.
- Tin, in blocks, pig, bars and sheets and plates and tin foil.
- Tobacco, unmanufactured, for excise purposes, under conditions of the Act respecting the Inland revenue.
- Tortoise and other shells, unmanufactured.
- Travellers' baggage, under regulations prescribed by the Minister of Customs.
- Trees, Shrubs and Plants, viz.:—Apple, cherry, peach, pear, plum, quince and all other fruit trees and the seedling stock of the same. Blackberry, currant, gooseberry, raspberry and rose bushes, grape and strawberry vines.
- Trees, shade, lawn and ornamental trees, shrubs and plants.
- Trees, forest, when imported into the Province of Manitoba or the Northwest Territories for planting.
- Treenails.
- Turmeric.
- Turpentine, raw or crude.
- Turtles.
- Ultra marine blue, in pulp.
- Vaccine and ivory vaccine points.
- Varnish, black and bright, for ships' use.
- Vitroil, blue.
- Vencers of wood and ivory, sawn only.
- Verdigras, or sub-acetate of copper, dry.
- Vegetables, viz.: Citrons, melons and yams.
- Vegetable fibres, natural, not produced by any mechanical process.
- Whiting or whitening.
- Whalebone, unmanufactured.
- Willow, for basket makers.
- Wire or brass or copper, round or flat.
- Wire or iron or steel, galvanized or tinned, or not, 15 gauge or smaller.
- Wire or spring steel, coppered for the manufacture of mattresses. No. 9 gauge and smaller.
- Wire rigging for ships and vessels.
- Wood for fuel, when imported into Manitoba and the North-West Territories.
- Woods, not further manufactured, sawn or split, viz.: African teak, black heart ebony, lignumvitæ, red cedar and satin wood.
- Wool, unmanufactured, hair of the alpaca goat and other like animals not otherwise specified.
- Yellow metal, in bolts, bars and for sheathing.
- Zinc, in blocks, pigs and sheets.
