a minimum of One Hundred Dollars 33 (\$100.00), and each other organization pr in membership shall pay an annual fee of not less than One Hundred Del-lars (\$100.00).

IX. Necessary travelling expenses of representatives when attending meet-ing of the Council shall be paid by the Cou

X. The Constitution may be amend-ed at any meeting of the Council by a two-third majority vote of the mem-bers present, provided that notice of such proposed Amendm.ant has been given at a previous meeting of the Council.


