

PICTON, ONT.—A new heating system will probably be installed in the public school.

PORT STANLEY, ONT.—The Council are considering a proposition for electric lighting.

KAMLOOPS, B. C.—The waterworks and electric light by-laws were defeated here last week.

LETHBRIDGE, ALTA.—Piche & Miron will build a two-storey store on Round street.

QUEBEC, QUE.—The erection of an Anglican church on Maple avenue is under consideration.

STRATFORD, ONT.—The Grand Trunk shops here will be enlarged, at an estimated cost of \$75,000.

HARROW, ONT.—Tenders are being taken by Rev. Father Reneaud for erection of R. C. presbytery.

CORNWALL, ONT.—The McGill Chair Company will shortly proceed with the erection of a factory.

SARNIA, ONT.—Tenders have just been taken for the construction of a sewer on Kathleen avenue.

SASKATOON, SASK.—J.W. Stewart, of the Frost & Wood Company, purposes building on First avenue.

PRESTON, ONT.—Boring is taking place in connection with the proposed waterworks system here.

ORILLIA, ONT.—The Buffalo Ice Company will build a warehouse here 400 x 100 feet and 40 feet high.

NELSON, B. C.—The British Columbia Government has been petitioned to build a new court house here.

GLACE BAY, N.S.—The Dominion Coal Company contemplate building a large number of miners' houses.

SHERBROOKE, QUE.—The Sherbrooke Power, Light & Heat Co. intend making improvements to their power house and plant.

NEEPAWA, MAN.—A site for the proposed post office has been selected on the east side of Mountain avenue.

GODERICH, ONT.—J. A. Fowler, architect, has prepared plans for remodeling and improving the town offices.

BRANDON, MAN.—The Rat Portage Lumber Company will erect a four-storey warehouse here in the spring.

PRINCE ALBERT, SASK.—The Council have decided to offer a free site for the Provincial Government building.

PORT ARTHUR, ONT.—The Council have appointed a committee to report on the extension of the municipal power plant.

SARNIA, ONT.—M. R. Burrows, architect, has been instructed to prepare plans for additions to the public library building.

PETROLEA, ONT.—The Town Council have agreed to provide the sum of \$17,000 for the erection of a new central school.

COOKSHIRE, QUE.—The ratepayers have approved of a by-law to aid J. T. Brock and associates to extend their foundry.

BERLIN, ONT.—The Berlin Rink & Auditorium Company have decided to install an artificial ice equipment costing probably \$8,000.

PEMBROKE, ONT.—J. Newton Ker, C.E., of Ottawa, has been engaged as engineer for the construction of proposed intake pipe.

MILTON, ONT.—Halton County Council have unanimously decided to proceed at once with the erection of a House of Refuge in this town.

FORT WILLIAM, ONT.—James D. McGregor and John C. Murray contem-

plate erecting two office and store buildings on Victoria avenue.

GUELPH, ONT.—L. C. Wideman, architect, has taken tenders on alterations and additions to the store premises of E. R. Rollerot & Company.

FOREST, ONT.—R. W. Fawcett, architect, of Sarnia, is preparing plans for extensive alterations to James Maylor & Sons' departmental store.

WATERLOO, ONT.—W. C. Bechtel has purchased 14 acres of land and intends erecting a modern brick making plant costing about \$12,000.

WALKERTON, ONT.—The Chairman of the Fire & Water Committee will submit a report to the Council on the cost of installing water meters.

KINGSTON, ONT.—H. P. Smith, architect, is taking tenders up to February 3rd for erection of club house for the Kingston Yacht Club Association.

DIGBY, N. S.—Steps are being taken to secure the erection of a new court house and jail. Plans for same have been prepared by F. R. Fair, architect.

ARNPRIOR, ONT.—The Diamond Park Mineral Water Company intend building large bottling works this spring on corner of John and William streets.

STRATHCONA, ALTA.—A by-law will be submitted to the ratepayers to issue debentures for \$35,000 for a waterworks pumping engine and other plant.

ROSSLAND, B.C.—It is stated that the Canadian General Electric Company have bought a site here on which to erect a plant for the manufacture of mining machinery.

STURGEON FALLS, ONT.—M. Healy, of Smith's Falls, was here last week in connection with plans for a new hotel to be built on corner of King and John streets.

MCIVER, ONT.—John McIver, Indian Agent here, will receive tenders up to Wednesday, February 28th, for erection of a church building on the Cape Croker Indian Reserve.

ORANGEVILLE, ONT.—The Hendrel Manufacturing Company have purchased the Orangeville Furniture Company's factory and intend building an addition in the spring.

ESSEX, ONT.—The Road and Bridge Committee of the County Council have recommended the construction of a steel bridge over the Canard river, at a probable cost of \$5,000.

NEW LISKEARD, ONT.—W. A. Middleton is promoting a company to establish a plant for the manufacture of paint from galena. It is proposed to build a crusher at Cobalt and a factory at this place.

PORTAGE LA PRAIRIE, MAN.—It is probable that a by-law to empower the Council to issue \$50,000 of debentures to complete the waterworks system will be submitted to the ratepayers early in the spring.

EAGLE CREEK, SASK.—Tenders are invited by H. Jeffreys de Winton up to February 6th for erection of school house, and up to February 15th for purchase of \$1,500 ten-year school debentures.

EAST TORONTO, ONT.—The Dominion Bank have leased a site on the south-east corner of Queen street and Broadview avenue and intend building thereon a branch bank costing not less than \$12,000.

UXBRIDGE, ONT.—The Town Council have appointed a committee to engage an engineer to report on a waterworks system, and another committee to report on the probable cost of building an Isolation hospital.

PORT ARTHUR, ONT.—Hedges & Burleigh, of Boston, have entered into an agreement with the Town Council to establish large steel tube works here costing about \$700,000. The Town will give them a site of 100 acres.

ST. CATHARINES, ONT.—It is expected that work will shortly be commenced on the proposed improvements to the police station. The plans as prepared by A. E. Nicholson, architect, show that the cost will be about \$6,000.

REGINA, SASK.—F. Gelinas, Secretary Department of Public Works, Ottawa, will receive tenders up to Friday, February 23rd, for the construction of post office building here. Plans on application to W. T. Mollard, Clerk of Works.

INNISFAIL, ALTA.—The School Board are considering plans for a \$30,000 brick school building here.—A by-law is being prepared to raise \$8,000 for fire protection.—H. McDermott, jeweller, will erect a large business block this spring.

GRAND FALLS, N. B.—The concrete dam proposed to be constructed by the Grand Falls Power Company will be 540 feet long between abutments and 28 feet high. It is understood that the Provincial Government will shortly approve of the plans.

APPLE RIVER, N. S.—The Department of Public Works, Ottawa, are asking for tenders up to February 19th for the construction of a breakwater at this place. Plans at offices of C. E. W. Dodwell, Resident Engineer, Halifax, and on application to the Postmaster.

OWEN SOUND, ONT.—The question of erecting a new public building for the joint use of the Town and County is being discussed.—The Electric Light & Power Committee will no doubt consider at an early date the question of extending the electric light plant.

WATFORD, ONT.—The Lloyd Automatic Wire Weaving Company, of Toronto, have made a proposition to the Village Council to establish a factory here for the manufacture of mattresses, hammocks, etc. They would erect a cement factory building 50 x 150 feet.

HAMILTON, ONT.—The City Council propose to construct pipe sewers on Bold street, Caroline to Hess street, cost \$552, and on Sherman avenue from Barton to Wilson street, cost \$2,092.—The Sewers Committee have decided to build the overflow sewer by day labor.

MEAFORD, ONT.—William E. Long will receive tenders up to February 5th for erection of a brick school house, with stone basement, for School Section No. 5, St. Vincent.—The Town Council have resolved to purchase additional pumping machinery for the waterworks power house.

VICTORIA, B.C.—T. D. Sedger, architect, has prepared plans and taken tenders for a residence at the Gorge.—At a joint meeting of the various boards of the province held recently, Rev. A. J. Saunders proposed a plan to build a summer residence in the Okanagan Valley, to be used as a Baptist College; estimated cost, \$25,000.
