MRS. PANKHURST AT WAR AGAIN

She Defies Government and is Promptly Placed Under Arrest.

[Canadian Press Despatch] LONDON, July 14.—Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst and Miss Annie Kenney, two of the militant suffragette leaders, defied the government and the courts of law this afternoon by appearing at the weekly meeting of the Women's Social and Political Union.

Mrs. Pankhurst said she had come against her doctor's orders, but that if she was well enough to be returned in prison by Reginald McKenna, the Home Secretary, she was also well enough to attend a meeting of her comrades.

Word has been received in Toronto that Major Cockburn, V.C., a native of that city, was accidentally killed by a horse on his ranch in Saskatchewan.

In addition to the Victoria Cross, he also held many other rewards for bravery, including the Royal Humane Society's medal for saving the lives of his two brothers from drowning.

FLYING MACHINE WRECKED NEAR OAKVILLE

Victor Carlstrom Flying From Brantford to Toronto Fell 700 Feet When Controlling Rod Snapped—Machine is Wrecked.

Losing control of his airplane while travelling at the rate of an 80-mile an hour clip near Oakville yesterday morning, Victor Carlstrom glided from a height of 700 feet to the ground. His machine struck a tree, and hung there, while he was flung out by the impact. He was uninjured, and came to Toronto by the afternoon train.

Carlstrom was flying to Toronto from Brantford. He left Brantford about 8 o'clock, with a heavy wind directly behind him. At 8:30, when he had covered 40 of the 60 miles of the trip, the rod by which he controlled the plane broke off short. He was 200 feet in the air at the time, and could only hold fast to the seat while the machine swerved and dipped and finally careened over on one side, plunging edgewise towards the earth.

Seen at the Palmer House last night the aviator could not account for his escape from injury or death.

Machine is a Wreck. "I must have been doing 80 miles an hour or better," he said. "My machine can do 50 miles without aid from the wind, and I had it right behind me this morning. The machine is a wreck. "The control lever," he explained, "is of light steel piping. I had bent it some days ago, and did not bother heating it when I bent it back, so I guess it was a bit weak. I had to use it a great deal this morning in the heavy wind, and at times there was a big strain on the rod. When an exceptionally heavy gust came along it snapped under my hand. "I stayed with the machine as long as I could. When she hit the tree I let her go. Suddenly, though, it's strange I didn't hit a branch and knock myself out, but I had all the luck. "Will you fly again?" asked The World. "Off for Another. "Yes I'm off for New York tomorrow morning to get a new biplane. You can expect me back Wednesday, or Tuesday night if the wind acts right. "Victor Carlstrom was to have made extra non flights in the city during the present week. He is from Colorado and was driving a biplane, which is fashioned, something like the Curtiss models, he point where he came to grief is two miles north of Oakville, in a farming district, and no great crowd collected to see the shattered machine. The latter will be shipped back to the United States to-day. Carlstrom worked strenuously all last week in Brantford in order to make daily flights but he was unable to secure the parts, required to repair the machine. He is considered a most successful aviator, but is inclined to be too daring.
