"PARIS OR DIE" SAYS KAISER TO HIS TROOPS

German Soldiers Have Lost Some of Their Former Enthusiasm.

[By Special Wire to the Courier] LONDON, Aug. 31.—6.55 p.m.—The Times correspondent at Ostend records, at second hand, a conversation with a German officer from Brussels, who said that frantic efforts were being made to inflict a crushing blow on the allies, especially on the English forces. Notwithstanding the successes achieved by the German army, the despatch says, there is a feeling among German soldiers that they are fighting against too great odds.

Despite all efforts to conceal the news from Prussia, it is stated information of a disquieting character regarding events there are beginning to circulate among the German forces, and this feeling of anxiety was intensified when two divisions totalling 80,000 men passed the Meuse by the bridge of Andenne at Selles, between Namur and Liege, enroute for Germany.

The Emperor has made it known to every soldier that his orders are to take Paris or die, the despatch concludes.

SIERGE OF PARIS

Very Different Matter Now to What It Was in the Year 1870.

[By Special Wire to the Courier] PARIS, Aug. 31.—Lieut.-Col. Leonce Roussel, the military critic, writing for his paper, the Petit Parisien, reassures those who may be frightened by the possible investment of Paris, that in 1870 the capital was held for nearly five months under conditions much different than those of today.

Second, the Germans had a free disposition, at least as far as Nanterre-Sur-Marne, of the Strasseburg-Paris through-railroad line, which at present they have not yet been able to touch the eastern fortified frontier, and have been driven back of Montagne, north of Valenciennes.

Third, the sole line of communication which passes by Belgium is at this point so precarious that it can be destroyed in a moment.

The investment of Paris, he declares, if it should occur, would be nothing but "an immense bluff," and would soon be interrupted.

IS STILL UNTRUE

Germany's Second Report of the Burning of Louvain is Handed Out.

[By Special Wire to the Courier] LONDON, Aug. 31.—A Copenhagen despatch to The Times says that the German difficulty in justifying the destruction of Louvain is shown to-day by the publication of the new version, different from the former and apparently equally untrue.

It is now said that the inhabitants, finding only one battalion of reserves and transport column in the town, formed the impression that the Germans were evacuating the town, thereupon the priests served out ammunition to the populace, which fired upon the unsuspecting Germans from all sides, wounding many.

The German patrol wagons were attacked by twenty-four hours of street fighting followed, and as a result, part of the town was burned.

TURKEY TO FIGHT? SAY GERMAN EMBASSY

Hints of Serious Consequences to Britain From Her Moslem Subjects.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 31.—The most significant of all the messages received via the Sayville radio route from Berlin was made public yesterday by the German Embassy in Washington. According to this message, which came to the Embassy early in the morning, Turkey is going to participate in the European war as an ally of Germany and Austria against Russia and Britain; there are hints in the despatch of fatal consequences to Britain from her Moslem subjects.

BELGIAN REPLY TO AUSTRILIANS

Assertions Made by Dual Country Are Declared to be False.

[By Special Wire to the Courier] ANTWERP, Aug. 31.—via Paris 12.26 p.m.—The following official statement was made public here today: "The Belgian Government, replying under date of Aug. 29 to the Austrian-Hungarian declaration of war, and the representations made at this same time, declares as follows: "Belgium always has maintained friendly relations with all its neighbors, and has fulfilled the duty imposed by neutrality. If she could not accept the proposals of the Germans it is because they had for their object the violation of an engagement which was a condition of the creation of the kingdom. Belgium does not think that any people, however weak, could mistake their duty and sacrifice their honor by inclining before force."

After setting forth that the Belgian Government had waited until its territory had been invaded before calling on France and Great Britain, the statement declares: "Belgium denies formally the assertions of Austria-Hungary."

BRITAIN MAKES CAPTURE IN THE PACIFIC

Apia, in German Samoa, Surrenders to Force From New Zealand.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 31.—The British capture of Apia in German Samoa, was announced in the following official message to the British embassy here today: "The secretary of state for the colonies has received a telegram from the Governor of New Zealand, stating that Apia in German Samoa surrendered at 10 a.m. on August 29, to an expeditionary force sent by the Government of New Zealand."

In connection with the seizure of the two Turkish warships in English shipyards, the foreign office sent the following statement to the embassy: "In accordance with the recognized principle of the right and supreme duty to insure national safety in time of war, His Majesty's government has not only offered to pay in full and return ships in good condition after the war or supply equivalent new ones, but also additional and generous compensation for the use of the requisitioned ships during the war."

WHAT'S DOING AT VAL CARTIER CAMP TO-DAY

Many Soldiers Still in Civilian Dress, Though Department Works Hard.

[By Special Wire to the Courier] VALCARTIER CAMP, Que., Aug. 31.—That an attempt was made to wreck a C.N.R. troop train early Sunday morning about 90 miles east of Montreal, was stated this morning by Lieut.-Col. Creelman, commander of the 21st battery of Montreal. An iron rail had been placed across the track, but the engineer was fortunately swept the obstruction in the ditch. The train was travelling at about 40 miles an hour at this particular point.

Very few troops arrived at the camp this morning, but two or three thousand more will be here within a day or two, making the camp strength approximately 30,000. The coming of the artillery has caused great activity in the camp, and the heavy work of mobilization is now practically over.

Colonel Samuel Hughes remains in his special car over night and was out on the training grounds early this morning watching the camp and battalion drill of several thousand soldiers.

He also visited the rifle ranges, where two battalions were being drilled in skirmishing and shooting.

The arrival of artillery has made more work for the two field hospitals, riders being kicked and stepped on by horses. But there were no serious accidents reported.

Many troops are still wearing civilian clothes, the service uniforms having not all been issued. However, the ordnance department has been doing excellent work, considering the heavy strain, and most of the outfits will be given out within a very short time. This was another dark day in camp, black clouds hanging over the Laurentians.

GOOD NEWS THIS

Oysters During the Winter Will be Plentiful, in Spite of War.

[By Special Wire to the Courier] NEW YORK, Aug. 31.—The finest oysters grown along the Long Island shores, which have always been held for the European and American trade will this season be put on the domestic market, according to growers to-day, who predicted that the crop would be the biggest in the history of the country, and that prices would be low.

For many years Europe has taken the finest oysters produced by this country. There are numerous beds along the Long Island shores that have produced oysters for the European market exclusively, but now the owners are unable to make shipments, and these oysters must be sold in the home markets. Comparatively few of these oysters have been supplied to the large hotels and restaurants of this country. The prices have always been high in this country.

Aside from this fact the oyster growers of Long Island reported yesterday that never before have the beds been in such fine condition and even if there had been no war, the crop was expected to be the largest in the history of the trade.

RED CROSS FOR EUROPE

WASHINGTON, Aug. 31.—The American Red Cross announced today that it had chartered the steamer Hamburg of the Hamburg-American Line, which will be re-named the Red Cross and sail on Saturday for Europe.
