American Red Cross  
Mission To Russia

**A**DISTINGUISHED party of physicians, surgeons, bacteriologists, professors of food chemistry, nutrition experts and dentists, making up the first unit of the United States Red Cross mission to Russia numbering twenty-nine in all, left Vancouver the other day on the "Empress of Asia," en route to the eastern front.

Lieut.-Col. Frank Billings, professor of medicine in the University of Chicago, is in charge of the party and is taking to Russia over \$100,000 worth of medical supplies, surgical instruments, dressings, water sterilizers and other necessary articles, including vaccine for the prevention of typhoid, smallpox, cholera, diphtheria, bubonic plague, meningitis and other diseases. A heavy task lies before them in Russia, and they are going abundantly prepared to go about their work.

The mission is being sent out by the United States Government, and the United States Red Cross Society will see that they are kept fully supplied in order to meet all demands for alleviating the suffering among the Russian soldiers and people. The move has been gratefully welcomed by the present Russian Government as an expression of the friendship of the people of the United States for Russia.

During the past month the United States Red Cross has raised over \$125,000, and while the work of the mission is under way, the American Red Cross will be sent to Russia to help the Red Cross there. The present party will investigate and report on Russia's needs and upon this report the United States Red Cross headquarters will decide the equipment and members of subsequent units. Steps are now being taken to get together complete equipment, even for motor ambulances.

Col. Billings and the other members of the mission are a sturdy and efficient party and are little better than the British. The colonel is exceedingly proud of his organization and the promptness with which it was effected.

"Every man who was approached to go on this mission," said Lieut.-Col. Billings, "had a good reason, and all the others, at once offered their services," said Col. Billings. "They dropped their work right there and got ready in four days, leaving their families behind them, to undertake this work, which is going to be of such tremendous importance to the Russian nation and to the military in particular."

It is only when one sees the tremendous effect of artillery long range fire," says Mr. Stewart Lyon, "that one appreciates the greatness of the menace." Recently an important French town was heavily shelled from a range said by our artillery expert to be 26 miles. "A new high velocity gun brought into use by the Germans recently is said to have effective range of 42,000 yards. A battery of these guns of either of these calibres and ranges mounted on the French coast near Calais would have absolutely stopped the navigation of the Straits of Dover and rendered the English country untenable by the civilian population. The amazing improvement of artillery makes it more than necessary that Germany shall not be Britain's neighbor across the Straits."
