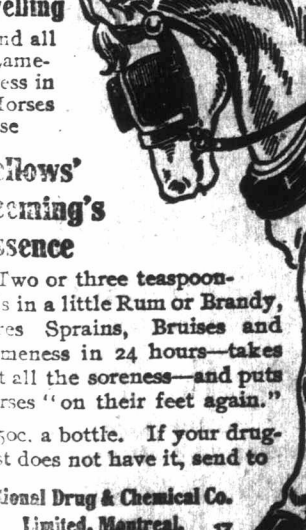

### CITIZENS' DAY GREAT SUCCESS

#### FAT STOCK PARADE AND RACES WITNESSED BY HUGE CROWDS—EXHIBITORS PLEASED

From Friday's Morning Leader. Citizens' Day at the Regina Industrial Fair brought out a big crowd, 2,100 seats having been sold for the grand stand before half-past two, and even then a big throng clamored for admittance to follow the good race card provided and see the platform attractions, while a great man, more to the general attractions and circus. When the treasurer tallied his receipts for the day the fact was revealed that over 15,000 people were on the grounds during the day, and the cash received reached a very tidy sum. The fair is the first of its kind in Saskatchewan to claim anything like a provincial character, and its success is shown by the large number of exhibitors of stock and products from all parts. In the morning the judges completed the Clydesdale classes and awarded the championships. By all odds this class is the most important in the show and its success is shown by immense value to the keen farmers, who followed the proceedings of the ring with the closest attention. The popularity of the Clydesdale keeping step as it has with the effort of half a dozen public-spirited Saskatchewan breeders to improve the stock, has been development of a more remarkable in that a dozen years ago the breeding in standard in this Province was pleurably low. Now Saskatchewan men are more than holding their own with Manitobans who have been in the game for years. In fact they failed to carry off the open stallion championship they ran. Sir William Van Horne's superb animal, Lord Arnold, who took a year to reach a decision, and they scored all in the female classes.

#### Stallion Champion

Three stallions paraded for championship honors with the above result, the others being P. B. Bredt's Baron Kerr (Regina), and W. H. Bryce's Baron of Agra (Moose Jaw). The aged and two year old classes respectively. The latter is a very fine imported colt, but he is not yet quite good enough to beat Lord Arnold.

#### Female Champion

The great fight of the day, however, was in the female championship. Four beautiful females competed, being four, three, two and one year old respectively, each having headed her class and not too much to say that no better four, representing the different ages could be got together in any ring on the continent and no injustice would have been done had the sweepstakes been awarded to any one of them. What added to the interest was that while the aged mare and the yearling filly were imported, the two and three year olds were home bred, being the progeny of Baron Gem, the famous sire who took championship honors at Winnipeg recently, formerly the property of A. and G. Mutch of Lunenburg, by whom these two fillies were bred, though they and their progenitor are now the property of another successful Regina district horseman, R. H. Tabor of Condit. Owing to his pressing stud engagements Baron Gem could not compete in Regina, but he is worthily represented by his progeny. Of the other two, P. B. Bredt of Regina, vice-president of the Exhibition Association, showed the four year old winner in the aged class, the imported mare Irena, sired by Labori. The yearling filly Lady Montrose, owned by Montrose, was imported into the city by W. H. Bryce of Arcola.
