**Italians Much Increased.**  
 Rome, Aug. 21.—The anti-French agitation, started in consequence of the massacre of Italians at Algiers-Mortas, has gained ground rapidly since the first demonstrations were made yesterday morning. Late last evening a mob attacked the Santa Chiara convent of French priests, tore down the scutcheons from the facade, trampled them under foot, smashed the windows, and endeavored to force the doors. Further damage was prevented by a strong force of police, who dispersed the mob and guarded the seminary until late last evening. A company of police are stationed at the French embassy, as the anti-French agitators have threatened to sack it. In Milan and Turin incendiary anti-French manifestos have been issued.

**Growing Indignation.**  
 Rome, Aug. 21.—The anti-French agitation spreads hourly. Demonstrative crowds paraded the streets last night shouting for the King and calling for revenge for the Algiers-Mortas massacre. The police were out in double force all the evening and prevented the crowds from becoming riotous. The benches played Italian and German anthems while the excited people are excited by the newspapers. They are unanimous in demanding quick reparation from France, and are ready to sacrifice their lives in satisfaction for the Algiers Mortas affair promptly and determinedly. At the same time the people are excited to maintain as possible the event of the German's action.

The yacht finished as follows: Satalita 1, Britannia 2, Navaho 3, Calluna 4.
